As Chris Wiggins said to me at the wake "it's pot luck who your neighbours are - you couldn't get better than Lionel and Sheila".



There are tours of the house and grounds every day at 2.00 pm and 3.30 pm (except Mondays and during special events). It is not necessary to pre-book.


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Special events this year will include concerts, film, a costume workshop, hawk and owl evenings, candlelit tours and art days.

THE FRIENDS OF NORTH ROAD SCHOOL



The old ones were falling down and had become unsafe so they have been removed and we hope soon to purchase the new ones. We are also regularly helping the school to purchase much needed equipment which their funding no longer stretches to.

The annual Duck Race will take place on Saturday, 23 April - starting from Templar Bridge in Yate. Ducks can be purchased for just £1.00 and anyone holding the number of the winning duck receives £25.00, with £15.00 going to second place and £5.00 going to third and last place ducks. Ducks can be purchased from the school office and, hopefully, the Post Office in North Road from about a month before the race. The event is great fun and, depending on the weather, some of the ducks race down the river at great speed.

The school will again be taking part in the Iron Acton May Day celebrations on the Village Green on Monday, 2 May. We hope to run a stall with crafts for the children to do on the day which they can take home with them. Last year's event was great fun for all involved (just a shame that the weather wasn't a little kinder to us). The Garden Calendar

April

Start hardening off bedding plants and veg transplants

Sow hardy annuals in situ

Sow vegetable crops: carrot, lettuce, marrow, onion sets

Feed spring cabbage, sow Winter greens

Plant second early and maincrop potatoes

Plant out transplants of pesa, leeks, cauliflower, broad bean and lettuce if weather is mild, or protected by a cloche

Plant out and stake sweet peas

You can sow grass seed from April onwards, providing temperatures are above 6°C

Hard prune shrubs - hardy fuchsia, buddleia, cornus, willow, evergreen hedges



July

Dead head and groom flowering plants in beds, tubs and baskets

Start taking semi-ripe cuttings of shrubs and alpines

Lift bulbs and store in a dry cool place

Start to Summer prune cherries, plums, apples and pears



May

Start feeding plants with a top dressing or liquid feed

Stake herbaceous perennials

May is the best time of year to plant water lilies and other aquatic plants

All tender plants can be planted out in beds, tubs or baskets, from mid May when the danger of frost is over

Continue to successionally sow vegetables: lettuce, spinach, peas etc.

Stake peas, earth up early potatoes

Sow dwarf French beans and runner beans outside

Plant tomatoes in unheated greenhouses

Thin out raspberry canesleaving 6 strong canes/plant

Peg down strawberry runners

Cut herbs and freeze or dry for winter use

Summer prune roses

Plant autumn flowering bulbs

Harvest and enjoy produce - have a party!



June

Monitor for pests and diseases and treat where necessary

Continue feeding plants every 7-14 days

You can start sowing perennials and biennials from June, out doors - Canterbury bells, verbascum, wall flower, sweet William, bellis, poppy, lupins, aquilegia, hollyhock etc.

Plant out runner beans, tomatoes, aubergines, peppers etc.

Prune shrubs that flowered in May/June

Summer prune gooseberries and red and white currants

The animals pictured are Meerkats. What's so special about them is their natural instinct to work as teams to keep themselves and their young safe. They take turns to go on look-out duty and by being alert warn others in the group of anything that might be suspicious or threatening. As Sir David Attenborough put it, their strength is their unity:

"This is the team where it's one for all and all for one."



As well as making the neighbourhood a better place to live and work in, tackling local problems and concerns will help people to feel less nervous about crime - especially those who are elderly or vulnerable for other reasons.

Each local scheme is run by a local co-ordinator. They act as a link between them, the local police and council, other Watches and community groups. The link goes in both directions. As well as reporting suspicious activities or seeking help and advice from the police, the co-ordinator will hear from them about incidents likely to affect the neighbourhood. These could be about burglars operating in the area, reports of bogus door-to-door 'salesmen', car thieves at work, or local drug dealing, for instance.

I have participated in the Avon and Somerset Police Ringmaster scheme and receive information about any crimes/suspicious incidents that have occurred in <u>our</u> area. If you would like to receive any information via e-mail, I will be happy to forward them onto you. Your e-mail address will only be held by me and not given to any others, nor will you receive any junk mail.

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POPPY APPEAL 2004


Again the time has come when I must thank you all on behalf of the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal for your generosity.

This work is done under the guidance of conservation experts which is why only part of the pond is cleaned at a time.

We continue to walk and check footpaths within the Parish working together with South Gloucestershire Rights of Way as well as landowners to ensure paths are accessible and sorting out problems as they arise. Some stiles will be replaced by us with the landowner's consent and with assistance from South Gloucestershire Council although responsibility for stiles is actually down to the landowner.



IRON ACTON WI

The year began with a subject that verged on mental torture The History of Fry's Chocolate Factory - all those good intentions begun with New Year resolutions to lose weight, stop eating chocolate and all things nice and there we were with pictures of bars of "Fry's chocolate cream" and Fry's Turkish delight" whizzing before our dazed eyes. Our speaker, Peter Goodchild, is an old friend of our's now - he's shown us some superb pictures of Bristol during the Blitz (fascinating for those who lived through those fearful times and also for the younger ones who luckily had only heard about it through anecdotes). Originally Fry's covered a large portion of the centre of Bristol - where the Odeon Cinema was right across by the Pithay until it moved to its current home at Keynsham. Many memories were brought rapidly to the surface and it was remarkable how many of our ladies could remember friends and family who had worked at Fry's.



February saw us practicing "Encaustic Art" - sounds painful, but all you need is a block of wax and a travel iron. CRIME PREVENTION ADVICE

Bogus Callers

Not all burglars break into homes - some will try to trick or con their way in. They are known as bogus callers and will pretend to be on official business from respectable concerns such as the utility companies (gas, electricity and water) or the council. They may claim to be tradesmen or workmen calling to carry out urgent repairs.

Bogus callers often succeed because they sound believable, so don't be fooled. Make sure in your own mind that they are whom they claim to be by following these simple steps:

- * Think before you open the door use your chain and spy hole or look out of the window to see if you recognise them.
- * Ask callers for proof of identity. Genuine tradesmen should carry an identification card with their photograph. Check this carefully. If you are unsure telephone the company the caller claims to represent.
- * Utility companies now offer a password identification system. Any caller from one of these companies should be able to give a pre-arranged password as additional proof of identity.
- * Beware of callers who attempt to distract you by claiming that they have seen something untoward in your rear garden or somewhere which may encourage you to leave your house - they may have an accomplice awaiting this distraction.
- * If you are not convinced of the identity of the caller DON'T LET THEM IN. Ask the caller to come back later and arrange for a friend, relative or neighbour to be present on their return and ask the caller to contact this person

Treat every stranger with caution. If you are still worried dial 999 immediately and ask for the police.

- * In an emergency dial 999 and ask for the police.
