


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

THE GURKHA WELFARE TRUST

Acton Aid recently made a contribution to the Gurkha Welfare Trust in memory of Melville Dron who died suddenly at the end of October last year.

Melville became a trustee of the Gurkha Welfare Trust when he retired from practice in 1994. He joined a group of senior army officers, most of whom had served with the Gurkhas, and his role was primarily to reorganise the financial affairs of the trust whose purpose is to provide pensions and welfare for retired Gurkha soldiers and their widows who had insufficient service to be eligible for a British army pension.

Since the early nineteenth century the British army has recruited from these fierce, brave soldiers from the state of Gorka in North East India, now known as Nepal, and they have participated in all major campaigns including both world wars. They are famous - and feared - for their close combat weapon the kukri, a curved sharp knife which is greatly effective in the face of the enemy.

Nepal is a small country wedged between India to the south and Tibet and China to the north. It has a population of about 22 million and is considered to be the fourth poorest country in the world. Because of the natural barrier of the Himalayas most social and trading contact is with India. The main religion is Hindu but there are now a large number of Buddhist refugees from Tibet in Nepal. The country is beautiful, mountainous with deep ravines and long rivers but suffers natural disaster such as earthquakes and floods frequently. There are no natural resources and in the hills, where the only transport is on foot, subsistence farming is the only means of survival. Medical services barely exist, the average life expectancy is 53 and the infant mortality rate is 10%. State education is limited and those children who are able to go to school often walk very long distances over mountainous terrain to get there.


The Nepalese people are proud to be associated with the British armed forces and there is much rivalry among the village boys when recruiting takes place. It is considered a great honour to have a member of the family in the Gurkhas and there is also financial benefit to the families as the Gurka soldiers send part of their salaries home. These days Gurka soldiers serving a term of 15 years are entitled to a regular army pension but there remain many short service men from World War Two and subsequent campaigns who do not qualify and who often suffer disability and live in poverty. The Gurkha Welfare Trust exists to pay a small monthly pension to such old soldiers, several of whom were awarded the Victoria Cross for valour. They receive this from the welfare stations also set up by the Trust and often being carried in baskets on the backs of their sons or grandsons so that they can "make their mark" on receipt of their meagre allowance.

Today Nepal is in the grip of civil war with the Maoists controlling large rural areas of the country. They often prey on Gurkha families as they know they are likely to have money which is confiscated at gunpoint. As a result of the unrest there is much corruption and major disruption caused by the recent assassination of the royal family has resulted in distrust of the present monarch.

Melville enjoyed almost 10 years working with the Trust during which time he visited Nepal and was able to observe the living conditions and lifestyle of these cheerful and courageous people who are so proud of their association with Great Britain. Through their bravery and sacrifice they gave much to this country so it is therefore fitting that in their time of need we can help to make their hard lives more tolerable. Melville would have been delighted to know that Iron Acton continues to support the Gurkhas in this worthy cause.

You should have received a copy of the Horticultural Show schedule through your door by now. If you have any queries or need further entry forms please get in touch with one of the committee members.



IRON ACTON PARISH COUNCIL

The Annual Meeting of the Parish took place on Friday, 28 April 2006 in the Marshall Room. Attendance was very poor with only 9 parishioners being present. The Parish Council would welcome more input from parishioners at all their meetings. We would like to remind you that the agendas for all meetings are posted on the notice boards (Parish Hall Car Park and North Road School) and in the porch of St James the Less Church. At the beginning of every meeting there is time set aside for public participation. Please look at the agenda and if there is an item that interests you feel free to attend the meeting and have your say.

Following the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council Bob Sheppard continues to act as Chairman and Rona Wright continues to be our representative on the Parish Hall Committee. Peter Wedgewood remains a Parish Councillor but has stepped down from the office of Vice-Chairman. Peter Bellis has now taken over the role of Vice-Chairman and we wish him every success in his new role.

Arising from the resignation of Paula Evans earlier in the year there is a vacancy for a parish councillor to represent the ward of Iron Acton. We would like to thank Paula Evans for her years of service. Anyone interested in becoming a parish councillor should contact the clerk.

In May 2007 there will be an election and it is likely that more parish councillor vacancies will arise at this time. The Parish Council plays a vital role at local level by providing a link between parishioners and South Gloucestershire Council. It is also responsible for the cemetery, allotments, parish meadow and village greens. If the Parish Council is to continue then new prospective councillors must come forward when candidates for the election are sought early next year.

There is currently a vacancy for a parish council representative on the Board of School Governors for North Road Community Primary School. If anyone is interested in taking up this role please contact the clerk.

Regrettably very few parishioners attended the Remembrance Service at St James the Less Church last November. For those who were there it was apparent that the current war memorial is showing its age. The officiating minister had great difficulty reading the names inscribed on the wooden plaque which have faded over time. The Parish Council (subject to the approval of the PCC/diocese) is considering replacing the current memorial with a marble plaque in keeping with other memorials in the church. The likely cost of such a plaque will be in the region of £5,000. The Parish Council would like to hear your views on the above proposal.

The Parish Council has received a number of requests from parishioners who wish to see improvements to the facilities for children and young people in the Parish Meadow. The Parish Council would like to hear from any teenagers in the parish about the facilities they would like to see. The Parish Council is also considering purchasing some play equipment for younger children.

Finally, the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005 gives parish councils the power to issue fixed penalties for litter, graffiti, fly posting and dog offences. The number of complains received in respect of dog fouling has increased considerably. Problem areas appear to be the cemetery, churchyard, allotments and Cassey. New signs have been ordered for the cemetery and allotments and a request has been submitted to South Gloucestershire Council to site a dog waste bin in the cemetery. Please pick up after your dogs otherwise you may find yourself being service with a fixed penalty notice – you have been warned!


NORTH ROAD COMMUNITY PRIMARY SCHOOL

Our Year 6 children enjoyed a fabulous week away with children from Rangeworthy School. Their visit to a PGL Adventure and Study Centre at Barton Hall in Torquay was a really unique experience. We were blessed with glorious weather (well, we were on the English Riviera) and the children thoroughly enjoyed the challenging and exciting range of activities on offer at the centre. They abseiled, developed their archery skills, took control of a quad bike, learnt camp craft skills, were hauled 10 metres into the air on a giant swing and even climbed a 6 metre pole AND dived off to catch a trapeze bar, amongst other similar challenges, all supervised by trained instructors, who taught the children the necessary skills to participate safely in the multi-activity week. I was designated official photographer and camcorder man so was unable to take a full role in all the exhilaration (well that was my excuse), but it was extremely rewarding to watch the children find the determination and courage to complete some of the very demanding tasks and for them to develop their communication, discussion, leadership and decision making skills and promote their sense of independence. After a gruelling Term 5, with their SATS, preparation and tests it really was an inspirational start to Term 6 for our Year 6.

Once again I must thank Acton Aid for their generous contribution to our school hall refurbishment. It is now complete and it looks very bright, cheerful and colourful and the blinds have enabled us to darken the hall and use the projector with our new large mobile screen to show DVDs, photographs and powerpoint presentations.

Our infant children were very pleased to have had the opportunity to perform their country dance at the Iron Acton May Day, helped along by lots of mums, and I know they enjoyed watching all the different dances that day. My son spent most of his morning there, repeatedly trying to score less than 20 with 3 darts!

We had a super week leading up to half-term because we played hosts to 7 visitors from Sicily and Poland as part of the Commenius Project that we are involved with. The visit



The Plant and Cake Sale organised by the Friends of the School was very well attended, despite the strong winds that virtually tore apart the gazebo on our playground which had sheltered quite a few of our plants and they sold almost as quickly as the cakes which "flew off the shelves". I was very happy with the 2 lovely hanging baskets I purchased, although my sunflowers have unfortunately withered already – slugs I can only presume. Our Year 6 children proved to be excellent waiters and waitresses, helping to sell the coffee and teas and were proving to be very persuasive young salespersons in the plant selling department.

We are sending a volleyball team to the Festival of Youth Sports Day at the Yate Outdoor Sports Centre and as we have been asked to represent Brazil the children have been busy making Brazilian flags and green, blue and yellow pom-poms for the opening ceremony. Our 2 football teams recently played Old Sodbury in football matches, winning both games despite the strong opposition and it was particularly rewarding to see a number of the younger children making their debut appearance for the school. The children were very disappointed that the Kwik Cricket tournament was postponed, as rain had stopped play, especially as they had trained quite hard for this event. Our netball team was delighted to take part in the recent 4th Annual Small Schools Netball Tournament.

The Yate based all girl band 3D was a real "hit" with the children on the last day before the Easter holidays. Their harmonies were excellent and their general standard of musicianship was very high. I had played in a band with the girls' dad, who is a quitarist, many years ago but he didn't last too long as he was simply too good for us! The Year 5 children are looking forward to taking part in a day of dance at Tortworth and a number of children who have been participating in a mummers' workshop will also get the opportunity to perform their mummer's play. We also have a number of students from the University of Bristol visiting soon to work with our Year 5 and 6 children in a music workshop and we have already booked a storyteller to come in for the day during the last full week of term. We have participated in wrong trouser day and are shortly to have a mufti day. By the time you read this we will have held our Summer Fair on Friday, 14 July and the previous week the children are taking part in an outdoor games evening and I have been assigned the task of preparing the obstacle course and our governors have already volunteered to show off their goalkeeping skills in a beat the goalie competition.

It won't be long before the Year 6 children visit their senior schools for their induction days and even the leavers' day is looming incredibly close now. Their transition to the "big" school must seem both an exciting and possibly daunting prospect but we hope they will remember many happy and enjoyable times in their 7 years at North Road School. Meanwhile we have already welcomed a number of this September's reception children and we are already looking forward to a number of events pencilled in for the coming Autumn term.



FAIRWEATHER BURGLARIES AND AVON AND SOMERSET POLICE NEWS

Now the warmer weather is on its way, thoughts turn to the summer holidays. During this period there is generally an upturn in the amount of house break-ins due to the empty houses and quieter residential neighbourhoods. If you are going away for the summer let your neighbours know and then they can keep an eye on your house and put your mind at rest. They could even pop round and put lights on and draw curtains to make the house look lived in while you are away. Other things, such as pushing post and papers through the letter box, will also prevent your house becoming a target for any house breakers.

A few points before you leave

- Make sure you cancel any deliveries and check out your home. Check locks of ground floor doors and windows, especially at the rear.
- 2 Check that upstairs windows overlooking flat roofs have locks. It is also important to ensure that your patio doors have effective locks and that they cannot be lifted off their runners by a garden spade.
- 3 Make sure your shed and garage are locked when you are out and don't leave the burglar with a ready assortment of implements to allow him to break in.

KEEP GROUND FLOOR WINDOWS SHUT ... ESPECIALLY AT NIGHT.

Good news

- * Avon and Somerset Police say that burglary rates have fallen. Your risk of being burgled is now lower than at any time in the last 20 years.
- * Despite this, the burglary rate is still too high but there is a lot you can do do to protect yourself against burglary and it's mostly common sense.
- * Nearly half of all burglaries happen when a home is empty, most are opportunist, around 2 out of 10 successful burglaries are through windows that have been left open or unlocked doors.
- * In many burglaries it takes just 5 minutes to break into premises, steal property and leave.

THE ACTONIANS



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


