You may remember the article asking for old spectacles for Gambia back in the Winter issue of FP. The Hunters have happily returned from their mega-adventure and the following article gives a fascinating insight.

THE HUNTER GATHERERS

We wanted to let you know about our Gambia challenge and how your much your help was appreciated. The good news is that our Postman Pat van made it all the way to Banjul in the Gambia and that when we auctioned it off after 4,700 miles for Gambian charities it raised $\pounds1060$. - this is the synopsis of our 4,500 mile journey:-

- * Ferry from Weymouth to St Malo
- * Long drives through France and Spain to Tarifa, close to Gibraltar
- * Ferry to Tangier in Morocco 5 hours to clear customs
- * Zig-zagged through Morocco due to poor signs and maps to Meknes
- * Through the beautiful Atlas Mountains to Marrakesh.
- * South through boring Western Sahara to Bedouin camp on edge of desert
- * Difficult border crossings from Morocco into Mauritania another 5 hours
- * 3 days of sand storms and soft sand in the desert. Van regularly stuck in sand.
- * Civilisation of sorts in Nouakchott at least we had running water and showers
- * Into Senegal with our compulsory customs guide. Lovely campsite called Zebrabra
- * 29 car convoy through Senegal 13 hour drive with only cakes and sweets to eat
- * Night in the police compound for our safety at Senegalese border
- * Hassled at the port. Long waits for Banjul ferry.
- * Arrived safely in Banjul on 17 January. Yippee!
- * Police escorted Parade through streets of Banjul for all 40 cars
- * First auction for group 3 cars raised £20K
- * Second auction for group 3 cars raised £18K.
- * All auctions this year should raise circa £175k for good Gambian causes.

Overnight accommodation included sleeping in the back of the van, camping (putting the tent up in the dark!), sleeping 30 to a Bedouin tent and sleeping in awful hovels with no running water. These were inter-dispersed with reasonable hotels and motels.

As you can probably tell, it was pretty demanding especially with the added concern of whether the van would make it through the desert in particular. The roads varied from good tarmac to dirt tracks with massive potholes - one car got written off when the wheel fell into a 3 foot deep pothole at 50mph. We had to be towed a couple of times as a result of further overheating - a result of sand getting in the electrical connections. We even got fined 10 Euro for being towed in Senegal - just an excuse for a bribe by the Police! Otherwise all the mechanical incidents were fairly minor. Our biggest difficulty was getting through the desert. We were just too heavy for the soft sand - 1500 pairs of specs weighed us down considerably!

The sand storm, the worst for 2 years, was unpleasant - like standing in a sand blaster in temperatures of 40degrees. We were lucky to have such a good team who pushed, dug and pulled us out. They really got us through. 3 cars in other small groups had to be abandoned in the desert so we did well. At least 4 other cars had to be abandoned en route due to mechanical problems and drivers had a very expensive nightmare in terms of fines, being ripped off and problems at border crossings as a result. A few experienced theft of passports, money and equipment through mugging or theft. Two of these were in Spain!

The highlights for us were the sense of adventure: seeing places like Mauritania and Senegal, not normally on the tourist map, were fantastic - even being woken at 5am with the chanting for call to prayers over loudspeakers from the Mosques had its charm. We loved the camaraderie of the group who made it fun not arduous, however difficult it got.



We felt so sorry for the children in the Atlas Mountains in the snow without shoes and the poverty in the rural areas of Mauritania where goats are the most important currency. Children and some parents would line the road to wave as we drove passed. We gave away some cuddly toys and pens en route but it was very difficult to do this without attracting hoards of children with the danger of starting a minor riot! We know that the goods we delivered to the Gambia were really appreciated.

We took the medical supplies to a clinic in the Bush where they have a visiting nurse, cuddly toys to the nursery at a Mission which looks after children from remote villages so they can be educated. Camping equipment and tools were also donated for distribution by the Mission to the most needy.

Pens (from Nat West and Halifax) and money were given to Bijilo Junior School where they have 1100 children aged 7 - 13 and one football. They are trying to grow their own vegetables using the water pump which was broken -they have had no rain from October to June! They have a new building built from donations as a new computer centre, but as yet no computers to put in it.

Finally we donated the 1,500 pairs of spectacles to the Banjul teaching hospital where they have 4 opthalmists who will grade the glasses and ensure they are given away free through their clinics in the remoter bush areas. Every pair of glasses was being recorded so that none would go missing! Some sun glasses were grabbed by the security guards at the hospital – apparently they are a status symbol!


The money from the Plymouth Banjul Challenge auctions is focused on sustainable tourism and sports projects: 20% goes to help small businesses e.g. training (ASSET), 20% to the Gambia National Olympic Committee

(GNOC) which also helped finance a team of Gambians in the Commonwealth Games in Manchester, and the remaining 60% Is distributed by a local committee to worthy local projects in tourism or sport. It is a well run organisation who care passionately about training, educating, helping locals to help themselves. We are confident that all these donations have made a real difference - one of the benefits of delivering charity direct to where it's needed.

The adventure was one of the toughest things we have ever Done but also one of the most rewarding and enjoyable.

In April we hosted the Spring Meeting for 100+ members of the Sodbury Vale Group of WIs - each institute takes it in turns and we'd got out of practise since we last hosted it 6 years ago! We still have one more event to organise in October but that's much more informal. This meeting begins with many formal items - acceptance of accounts, minutes, institute reports after which we're in dire need of light relief and this year it was provided by Richard Lewis from Radio Bristol who had us in tears of laughter with his anecdotes and humour. A lot of arm twisting had been needed to get him to agree as he loves the anonymity of the radio studio but is much less comfortable facing an audience but we were so desperate for a good speaker that we couldn't let him say no and, bless 'im, he reluctantly agreed (luckily we go back a long, long way as we were at the Ridings together and we've periodically kept in touch ever since). We also provide a plated finger buffet, pudding and coffee - which our sterling little band did with military precision. Ticket price was just £2.50 and we even managed to make a profit to carry over to October! Gordon Brown's "Prudence" could well be a member!

In the next few months we'll be preparing for Christmas, when we'll (hopefully) learn how to make door hangings, ribbon bows and cards (this is in September as it usually takes us a long time to produce anything that looks remotely decent), we then get a visit from Slimbridge Soaps in October - they'll be explaining how the company came to be, how soap is made and we'll have an opportunity to buy items from their range - having seen and smelt these in the craft tent at Berkeley Show I can't wait! Parish Meadow

Our contractor continues to cut the grass in the meadows on a regular basis. However they have recently reported that there appears to be an escalation in the dog fouling problem with owners not clearing up after their animals - both in the meadow and the play area - despite bins being provided. The play area has to be a dog free zone - which is why it is fenced. It is difficult to know how to tackle this problem because as a Parish Council we are responsible for providing a play area that is free of fouling. We have contacted the South Gloucestershire Dog Warden who has provided us with notices that we can put up. If anyone witnesses owners not clearing up after their dogs please ring me. The new play equipment is on order and we hope it will be installed before the school summer holidays.

Tennis Courts

The Parish Council has arranged for the tennis court lines to be repainted. We have also installed new posts and nets because the previous nets were so badly damaged. Nearly £900 has been spent on bringing the tennis courts up to scratch for the benefit of parishioners. We are currently looking into the cost and installation of a basketball hoop

Chilwood

There have been (and continue to be) tremendous problems in the Chilwood area with raves, damage to gates and fences and inappropriate use of bicycles and motorbikes. All of these activities are being reported to the police as and when they happen. The Parish Council is in the process of wording and ordering signs to be erected in the woodlands area so the police have the power to act and potentially prosecute wrongdoers. Chilwood was given to the parishioners of Iron Acton for their enjoyment and has been designated an area of ancient woodland.

Please, if you witness any damage taking place or inappropriate behaviour, report it to the Crime Record Unit at Avon and Somerset Police. The number is 0845 456 7000.

North Road

Unfortunately our notice board has been continuously vandalised. We are arranging for it to be taken away for repair which hopefully will sort the problem out.

Allotments

There has been some wanton damage to the Nibley Lane allotments. This has been reported to the police. This sort of incident is such a shame as allotment holders devote many hours to the upkeep of their plots.

Neighbourhood Watch

I have been asked to mention that our co-ordinator, Jack Russell, and his family will be leaving the village this summer for pastures new in Canada. If there is anyone who would be prepared to take on this role please let me know so that I can forward your details. As you know, members of neighbourhood watches enjoy lower house insurance premiums with some insurers. There have also been a number of break-ins within the parish recently. These burglaries have happened during the day so please be vigilant.

Chilwood Green Play Equipment

You may recently have seen in the Lib Dems Focus magazine a proposal to install play equipment on the green. Parish Councillors have had representations made to them about this and a number of concerns have also been raised. It has been decided to canvass residents in the immediate area to gauge the overall opinion. A questionnaire is being prepared and when responses have been received these will help the Parish Council to make an informed decision.

Parking

South Gloucestershire Council has now taken over responsibility for parking enforcement from the police. If you witness any parking infringements please let me know or get in contact with the Council.

Ian's emphasis was on conserving the natural habitat and old barns for the protection of wild owls. Many special nesting boxes have been put in carefully selected areas where there is suitable feeding habitat. After the slides Ian introduced us to his own beautiful Barn Owl called Misty - which had been rescued when tiny.

Bruce Hall, Chairman of the Cotswold Canal Trust, gave a most enthusiastic talk in April. He used a series of illustrated slides to take us on a journey along the 37 miles of waterways from Saul Junction to the River Thames that the trust is committed to restoring.



In May John Osbourne entertained us with Music and Verse, singing and reciting several of his poems. John is a farmer from Weston near Bath and most of his verses are based on his life and experiences on his farm. Any proceeds from the sale of his books and from visiting organisations, such as our Ladies' Club with Music and Verse, go to Cancer Research and John's local church.

At our June meeting members were intrigued by the slight of hand of Tony Griffiths. The Art of the Magician is a talk/show presentation that explores various aspects of the magician's art in an entertaining way. Of course there was a fair amount of audience participation which made for lots of laughter.

We always have an evening trip for our July meeting and this year we will be travelling by coach to the Bristol Blue Glassworks for demonstrations, followed by a buffet.

Our programme for the remainder of this year is as follows:

Thanks to everyone who came to the Curry Night back in March. It was a great evening with superb, traditional Indian cuisine and live music from local group The Taylor Brothers.



THE ACTONIANS 40TH ANNIVERSARY DINNER

I have been a member of the Actonians since just before the turn of the century (doesn't that sound a long time ago!). It is a wonderfully friendly and welcoming company in which it has been very easy to feel at home and I thoroughly enjoy the team work, camaraderie and commitment that goes into the productions that we put on each year. Through the ongoing archive work (carried out both painstakingly and lovingly by Ray Bulmer) we also maintain a real sense of the history and development of the group, much of which is available on our excellent website (www.actonians.org.uk). Therefore there has been a considerable sense of anticipation for this 40th anniversary year and the rather clandestine activities of the sub-group committee charged with the responsibility for planning the celebration. Those plans were made manifest on the evening of Friday, 8 June 2007 and what an excellent event it was.

We celebrated our 40th Anniversary with an Anniversary Dinner at the Cross Hands Hotel in Old Sodbury. Over 90 people (Actonians past and present, friends and associates) gathered in the main dining area sufficient numbers to ensure that we had the place to ourselves. The first surprise of the evening was that there was an organised seating plan and each place setting was personalised with a small pair of glass framed photos showing 2 roles that each member (past and present) had played. This was a lovely touch and provoked many reminiscences and much laughter as the pictures were examined and stories told. Then we ate, and what a splendid meal it was: asparagus spears and hollandaise sauce, salmon and mixed salad, roast beef with plentiful vegetables, a baked Alaska and coffee. After each course guests would get up and move around the dining room meeting up with old friends and sharing memories so the whole meal had a wonderful informality to it whilst being in the fairly formal atmosphere of an hotel dining room. Alongside the joy of meeting up with new and old friends, Ray Bulmer had also created a wonderfully engaging display from 40 years of archive material which told the story of the group from it's early beginnings in the 1960s to its current place in the annals of Bristol and Avon amateur drama. This was pored over throughout the whole evening and generated great pleasure for all.

Steve Birch, the current Chair, opened the next part of the proceedings with a reflection of the history of the group with a number of anecdotes and memories from the previous 40 years. This was simply the precursor to the main speaker of the evening who was John Inverdale, one of the BBC's main presenters of sports programming and, rather more importantly on this occasion, an erstwhile member of the group. His opening line of "Ladies, Gentlemen and Fellow Actonians" was greatly approved of by the entire gathering. John entertained us with a fine speech covering both his early memories of rehearsals in the local pub, and further anecdotes from his more recent past. It was perfectly judged in terms of length, and expertly delivered with a very passable impersonation of John Arlott's Hampshire burr in the telling of the final story.

STEINER KINDERGARTEN

Hidden away at Cromhall Village Hall there is a local Steiner Kindergarten, which has grown out of three parents' desire for something natural and gentle for their children. It is the only provision like it in the area, families come from many nearby towns and villages, including Wotton, Thornbury, Cromhall, Iron Acton, Yate, and Charfield.

So what can you expect from a Steiner Kindergarten? The focus of the kindergarten is on creativity and imagination rather than facts and learning goals. It is a holistic, organic and nurturing environment.

One parent commented: 'I know without a doubt that the careful thought behind every detail of the kindergarten life has a positive impact on my daughter. It weaves its magic around her and brings out the best in her, allowing her to flourish and bloom."

The kindergarten is run by Clare Benson, a fully trained Steiner Teacher, along with an assistant. The kindergarten is always a hive of activity but is never over stimulating. In a Steiner kindergarten the children learn through imitation and imagination. The rhythm and routine of the morning are very important. It helps the child feel safe and secure in the knowledge of what to expect next.

The child will be drawn into the kindergarten with a carefully prepared main activity: Painting on Monday; baking on Tuesday, modelling on Wednesday, drawing on Thursday. After that comes free play with toys made of natural materials. The children might play with simple dolls in the home corner or become involved in building an elaborate house boat out of tables, stands and cloths. This time encourages initiative, cooperation and imagination. The children will all help each other with tidying the room ready for circle time. Circle time takes place with seasonal singing and rhymes. Next comes snack time with a fully organic food, prepared together and then a walk, whatever the weather, in the lovely countryside arcund Cromhall. The morning finishes with a simple story and goodbye song.

The Mulberry Tree Steiner Kindergarten runs 4 mornings and 2 afternoons every week and also offers holiday care. It is fully OFSTED registered, receives nursery vouchers and is open for 3-7 years olds. We also run a toddler group near Yate and Nailsworth. IRON ACTON PRIMARY SCHOOL

Well, where has this year gone? We met the new Reception Class this week and hope they will all be very happy at Iron Acton School. At the other end of the school, Year 6 has already met their new tutors and will soon be going to their induction days. We shall miss them all and wish them the best of luck for the future.

We still have lots of exciting events to look forward to such as picnics, PSHE week, sports day and the, ever popular, whole school trip - which will be to Slimbridge.

This year the main focus for the whole school has been working towards making school life healthier and safer for the pupils. Throughout the year Miss Baddeley has been working on 3 whole school projects.

Firstly we have submitted a travel plan to the local authority. If we are successful it will make pupils' journeys to school much safer whether they walk, cycle or come by car. It will also provide us with the funds for cycle racks, wellie holders and a covered waiting area.

Secondly we are working towards national health school

status. This has involved many different activities and initiatives. All pupils now receive 2 hours of high quality PE a week, including a daily brain gym session which helps prepare them mentally for the day's work. They all love this activity and have become so good at it that they can run it themselves and will be demonstrating their skills at the celebration event in July.

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Finally, we have been looking at different ways to improve the pupils' personal and social skills to help them better understand and manage their feelings and how to deal with playground and friendship issues.

Our kitchen goes from strength to strength under the guidance of our new kitchen manager, Julie Wilding. The highlights of the year must be receiving a 5 star food hygiene rating from the Environmental Health and Trading Standards, parents and grandparents have joined us to sample the new menus and the very successful 5-A-Day Week promotion when pupils tasted exotic fruit and vegetables.

With rising numbers space has become a real issue for the older pupils, who are packed like sardines into the mezzanine classroom. Two of our brave parents are completely transforming the classroom with new storage units and we are currently working with the local authority on an ambitious plan to extend the classroom to link up with the space in the old school house.

Pupils have continued to receive extra opportunities in music and sport. As part of the extended school projects after school clubs have been run for junk bands and Taiko drumming – we have also benefited from sports coaching in tennis, athletics and mini golf.

We have had another successful year working with other local small schools on joint projects. Working on a tree theme the schools joined for activities such as sculpture days, music workshops, environmental days and an arts festival. Some of you may have seen groups of pupils working in the Parish Meadow and school fields as part of a maths trail day. Last week Year 5 pupils from all schools met at Bradley Stoke School for a Small Schools Parliament with Steve Webb, our local MP.

On May Day the pupils did us proud. Nearly everyone turned up and, despite the weather, gave 100% to their performance. The maypole dancers were excellent. The mummer's play was a new venture and not the easiest of things to do in a large outdoor space. The 5 brave girls gave a perfect performance. A new venture was the junk band performance with Mike Hoddenot. This gave a real carnival feel to the festivities and certainly brightened up the afternoon.

This year will be a sad year as we say "goodbye" to some very special members of our team. Mrs Elmore will be leaving in August to take up the Deputy Headship at Crossways Junior School in Thornbury. We are also saying farewell to Dr Mansfield. She has worked tirelessly to support the school as a parent, member of the Friends, Chair of Governors, netball trainer, cycling trainer, supporter in class, maypole dance coach, transporting pupils to events and much, much more. We will miss both of them very, very much.





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
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
