IRON ACTON PRIMARY SCHOOL

We started the year with several new faces. We welcome the new Reception pupils and the 4 new pupils who have joined further up the school. We also welcome 2 new members of staff: Miss Brooks to Class 3 and Mrs Benarous to support Year 2 each morning. We hope they will all be very happy at school.

This term has a very musical theme. Each week the older pupils work with 2 tutors on choral singing and a samba band instruments. This week the younger pupils had a very exciting morning taking part in a Gamelan workshop.



With our ever rising numbers space had become a premium – especially for the older pupils. During the summer holidays the school was a hive of activity as teams of builders extended the mezzanine classroom to link up with the space in the old school house. It was an ambitious undertaking with builders in every day of the school holidays. However, it was well worth the upheaval as Class 3 has been completely transformed with more space, separate toilets, an additional fire exit and changing facilities. In a separate project the stair well has been redecorated and our pupil/staff kitchen has finally been finished. Pupils can now carry out food technology activities in a modern, hygienic, attractive room.

As a church school it is important that we have a strong spiritual and religious focus. Following Rector Sue's retirement and Curate Jane Tailby's resignation we are short of foundation governors. Rev David Harrex has managed to find one "volunteer" but there is still one vacancy. If you are interested in supporting our school in this role please let myself or David Harrex know.

DOROTHY WILKINS

We were saddened to hear that Dorothy Wilkins had died during late September - even though she had reached the glorious age of 96. Dorothy was the wife of Charles who was one of the founding lights of Focal Poyntz (or Focus as it was first known). It was certainly true that behind every good man is a very good woman and they were a joyful double act within the village community. Many were reduced to tears at the sight of "her" trying to control "him" ... not always succeeding ... and of the wonderful evenings full of good company and liquid refreshment (Roy Hubbard will be testify to these!)

Dorothy was legendary within the WI as she had summoned the then president for a cup of tea and proceeded to tell her she was concerned their meetings were having an increasingly alcoholic bias (in one year there had been a visit to Harveys for a sherry tasting and a talk on the subject of "Port Wine and Old Masters), a little appeased after an explanation she always kept an eye on them as, due to to ill health, she hadn't been able to join in their meetings after years of active participation.

The other anecdote has to do with her driving. She had been a nurse and had driven during the war - she still drove like a cross between Sterling Moss and an angry army ambulance driver, fast and make sure you got out of her way. The top end of the High Street had to be approached with apprehension and trepidation as, at any moment, Dot's lovely little black car could go hurtling up towards Holly Hill regardless of what or who was coming in the other direction and, even if you thought you were in the right, just one look would make you know what she thought!



A lady who lived life to the full, had a rich library of amusing (and sometimes risqué) stories and who, with just the very mention of her name, arouses many happy emotions. She was a true character and one who will be much missed.

USED CHRISTMAS CARDS

From 2-31 January 2008 Tesco (including selected Express Stores), W H Smith, T K Maxx and Marks and Spencer will be collecting used Christmas cards on behalf of the Woodland Trust. Look out for the large green and white cardboard containers. Their 2008 target is to recycle 100 million cards and to plant 24,000 trees.

The PO is along on your right hand side gently (and suitably) nestled between the Cross Keys and North Road School.

A 2 pint Local Choice container costs just 1p more than the normal milk but the Local Choice label is one of the ways that Tesco is supporting small local farms. The farms have to confirm to high welfare standards and Tesco commits to collecting and selling the milk locally - which also supports the environment by reducing food miles. I only found it on the shelves when the normal 2 pint containers I buy were out of stock - I found it tucked away, almost out of sight, with the organic and soya and goat stuff. (LB)



ACTON COURT OPENING DATES IN 2008


Advance notice that in 2008 Acton Court will be open from 17 June to 24 August.

IRON ACTON PARISH COUNCIL

Please find outlined below an update on the activities in and around the Parish.

Parish Meadows. Unfortunately I have to report that completely irresponsible and mindless damage has been caused to a 10m length of wall at the back of the tennis courts. From inspection, it was obvious that the wall has been pushed out from the Meadows into the adjoining field, and a hammer of some description used to smash some of the stones. The majority of the stones had been put in the stream in order to block it up! The wall has now been repaired at a cost to the Parish of £700.

Tennis Courts. It was great to see so many people using the newly painted and netted courts over the summer, obviously Wimbledon sparked a great deal of enthusiasm! Please remember that the courts can be booked through me, as Clerk, to avoid disappointment.



Play Equipment. The play equipment has now been installed in the Parish Meadows. This equipment was installed following consultation, and a presentation made by the

children from Iron Acton primary school. There have been a few comments from Parishioners about the amount of equipment that was installed, and there didn't appear to be very much considering we have spent over £8,000, including VAT. Unfortunately the cost of robust play equipment is expensive and we are also obliged to install safety matting around equipment that has a 'fall height' in excess of 1m. This matting costs in the region of £20 per square metre, and we had to install 84m². The two sit-in spring items were in excess of £1,100, the see saw cost in excess of £1,100, the balancing step logs and wobble board cost over £500, the rock hold wall was nearly £1,000, and the four picnic benches cost several hundred pounds each.

Unfortunately during the course of the summer holidays the slide was damaged - the side support rails had snapped and a hammer had been used to create dents in the slide. This has now been repaired at a cost of $\pounds 40$.

Chilwood Close Green Play Equipment. I can report that letters and questionnaires were delivered to residents of Chilwood Close, Algars Drive and Nibley Lane. Of the responses we received 61% were against the installation of equipment, 30% for and 9% had no views either way. Therefore the Parish Council will take no further action.

Chilwood Woodlands. Fortunately the raves appear to have stopped due to a combination of the inclement weather and a reinforced Police presence. We have liaised closely with the Police over the summer months concerning signage to be installed. These signs are now with a local manufacturer and will be installed as soon as possible. During discussions with South Gloucestershire Council about the problems the Parish were having in the Chilwood Woodlands area, I spoke with one of the Environmental Officers who informed me that they were carrying out a survey on the river Frome to see how the population of White Clawed Crayfish were fairing. Unfortunately they do not appear to be doing very well, and there is little evidence of their presence. However on a brighter note, the Environmental Officer was able to tell me that they have found evidence of otter movements all the way along the river from Frampton through to Yate!

Footpaths. A number of footpaths around the Parish have become extremely overgrown with brambles and nettles etc. We have in the past used Community Service offenders to cut and strim the affected footpaths. I am aware of a number of footpaths that need to be dealt with, but if you regularly walk a certain footpath that needs looking at, please let me know. **Neighbourhood Watch.** Just a reminder that a Co-Ordinator is still required. If you are interested, please contact me.

North Road. On various occasions North Road has had to be dug up due to frequent ruptures in the sewer pipe under the road. This has caused considerable inconvenience to residents. The Parish Council wrote to Wessex Water making them aware of the trouble that this was causing. Wessex Water responded that in their 2008 Capital Expenditure Budget they have allowed for the replacement of the pump and pipe line.

Allotments. Over the course of the Autumn, we have removed 14 tonnes of rubbish and rubble from the back of the Nibley Lane allotments. Within a couple of days of this being removed, approximately 1 tonne of rubbish has reappeared! Please, can I remind everyone that this area is not a dumping ground, and to remove the rubbish costs the Parish a considerable amount of money.

Dog Fouling. It has been brought to our attention that there appears to be an increase in the amount of dog fouling within the cemetery area. As you can appreciate, this is not a particularly nice thing to discover when relatives visit the cemetery. We are in the process of requesting the installation of a dog bin within the cemetery, but I would also like to remind everyone that there is a financial penalty for anyone caught or witnessed allowing their dog to foul in a public place.

As ever, if you see anything that you feel should be brought to the attention of the Parish Council, please let me know.

VIEW FROM NORTH ROAD SCHOOL

Well, the summer holidays came and went, although the supermarkets would have you believe they didn't even happen, with their "back to school" posters displayed in their first week! Blackpool beckoned this summer for one week, my son's first choice, though I suppose one has to do one's bit for the English Tourist Board, even though it's all true what the newspapers were reporting – that a week in Blackpool is more expensive than a week abroad. Now our thoughts turn to harvest and it won't be long before we will be appealing to the children to bring in harvest gifts for our service. These will then be auctioned off to parents and the proceeds from the auction are donated to the on-going projects in Genieri in the Gambia – the children always love to be reminded that the Genieri villagers have a small fishing boat named after North Road School.

Our Year 5 children have recently returned from their 3 day residential to the Robert Jefferies Centre in Abergavenny – where they had the most wonderful time. The children were very excited, regaling us all with stories of their expeditions and it would seem that their favourite activity was the waterfall walk, followed closely by the drinking of, apparently, the best hot chocolate in the world. We've also recently held our presentation evening for the Year 6 children and their parents regarding their 5 day residential help to promote a positive attitude to challenge and adventure and, of course, help to develop the key skills of independence, leadership and teamwork.

Whilst we very much believe in developing the whole child at North Road and are continually looking for and embracing enrichment opportunities we were also delighted to be able to announce to parents that the teacher assessments of the infant children and the SATS results of our recently departed Year 6 children were excellent this year and that is certainly testament to the commitment and hard work o the children, staff and the strong partnership we enjoy with parents.

We are expecting our new building work to start shortly and we are all looking forward to the positive impact the kitchen extension and refurbishment will have on the quality of school lunches. Security will also soon be greatly enhanced when we have our new reception lobby in the office with a secure front gate system which will, in the words of our local crime reduction officer, make the playground a sterile area to "strangers". I know we are very fortunate to have on board enthusiastic school governors who have been very busy this summer helping with the initial planning stages of the project to ensure that we will be guaranteed best value for money from the final build.

We are also very lucky to have such an active Friends of the School group too, who have provided much of the funding to pay for many of our enrichment opportunities. The Summer Fayre was a real crowd puller, even though much of it had to be brought indoors as the heavens opened. The End of Year Disco also proved to be as popular as ever. The Friends are very busy organising a Ladies Evening for October and have all sorts of stalls booked. They are also in the planning stages of our Christmas Fayre - which will be on Friday, 14 December. They also very kindly helped to serve the teas and coffees for our coffee morning as part of the World's Greatest Coffee Morning for

McMillan Cancer Support in their attempt to raise over £7m.

We were extremely pleased that we won the Yate Town Council's School Gardening Competition for the second successive year. At the end of the Summer Term we were presented with the winner's shield by the Mayor of Yate as we've actually won it now 6 times in the last 10 years. Each class has its own flower/vegetable bed and all the children contribute to the planting, cultivating and maintaining of their own special allotment.

The school football team has already beaten strong opposition in the first round of the Small Schools' Cup Tournament and is looking forward to an inter school tournament in mid October. The badminton and chess clubs are proving to be very popular. The Mad Science



club is starting up again after the half term holiday and we have now started an after school multi-sports club for our Years 1 and 2 (which we are funding with money secured from an extended schools bid) and we soon hope to start an after school choir.

We're organising another walk to school week for mid November and another weekend family bike ride very soon. The whole school will be going to the pantomime before Christmas to see Robin Hood at the Ridings High School's Arts Centre and we have invited the Image Theatre back to school in the New Year to perform one of their participation musicals which is called "Tom's Midnight Garden". Finally, we are continuing to enjoy close links with our Small Schools' Network Group as we plan new collaborative projects which will include another junior parliament day, a day of dance, a maths fun day, theatre workshops and an arts week - which I know the children will really look forward to.
