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



- 3 Take your Registration Form to the Entries Desk where individual Class Tickets will be written out for each class you have entered.
- 4 Once in the Hall, the Hall Marshalls will assist you in the placing of red stickers on your exhibits. Basically, if you want to keep your entry after it has been judged, place a red sticker on the Class Ticket. If you are happy for the entry to be auctioned off after the show leave the Class Ticket blank.

As the sun came out tables and chairs were quickly moved onto the grass area outside the hall where parents were able to chat whilst children enjoyed the bouncy castle, played football or had their faces painted.



A warm welcome extended upon arrival was enhanced by the offer of Bucks Fizz served from a table decorated with balloons and flowers. Then, an opportunity to talk to representatives from St Peter's Hospice as they promoted their "Lotto" opportunities.

The "kitchen" staff enjoyed the facilities of the new hall kitchen, making their task more comfortable – apart from the inability of the cookers to keep up with the required heat. The "front of house" team was kept on the constant run as they served hot food, cereals, toast and fruit juice to the non-stop stream of customers. The hall looked lovely with flowers decorating the tables and stage and the raffle ticket sellers did a sterling job.

All this culmination of dedicated team work enabled us to send a total of £1,763 to St Peter's Fundraising Office, with which of course they are delighted.



THE STORY OF ONE FAMILY HOUSE AND ONE SPECIAL LADY IN THE HIGH STREET

If you passed on 11 June near the Fursman's house in the High Street you could hear the sound of people and music coming from Marjorie's garden. This place used to be well known in the village years back when it contained a local store that provided many of the needs of everyday life to the people of the village.



Vincent G Fursman, Marjorie's father-in-law, had acquired the General Stores in the High Street in 1911. It really was a general store, selling foods as well as everything else. At one time it was usual for a pig to be reared in the back garden, slaughtered by the the local butcher (also retailing in the High Street), cut, cured and sold - all on the premises.

On that evening the Fursmans held a party to celebrate 100 years of the family house in the High Street and the 99th birthday of Marjorie Florence Fursman (which, in fact, was the day before on

10 June). Her interesting life story started parallel to the story of the Fursman's Stores in Iron Acton.

Marjorie Florence Fursman (nee Burcombe) was born in Bristol on 10 June 1912. Her father, Steven Burcombe, died when she was only 3 years old while her sister was being born in the other room. When Marjorie was 17 years old she and her 2 siblings, Leslie and Cathleen, lost their mother, Florence Burcombe, and became orphans.

Life hadn't been easy for Marjorie in the following years but, watching the unimpressive care that her mother received while she was ill, reinforced her early ambition to become a nurse and, at the age of 21, she was accepted onto a 3 year nurse training course at the Bristol Royal Infirmary.

Afterwards Marjorie went on to fulfill a 6 month midwifery course. In 1938, following the completion of that course, Marjorie moved to London where she worked in a Fever Hospital in the East End but the Second World War came along and upset that training. The government took over a large mental hospital at Basingstoke; Park Prewett. There she worked until 1940 when she returned to Bristol to join a neuro-surgical team for the West of England that was based at the BRI. The department transferred about a year later to the Burden Institute at Stapleton where Marjorie eventually became matron.

In 1941 Marjorie was part of the team to perform the first lobotomy operation in England (brain surgery used in the treatment of intractable mental disorders) which was reported at the time in the local papers.

In 1946 the department was moving to Frenchay Hospital and Marjorie was offered the job of Theatre Sister. Unhappily for the NHS, but happily for Iron Acton and particularly for Mr George (Bunny) Fursman, she decided on a change of career and marriage. It started with them running a shop at Stapleton and after Vincent Fursman died in 1966 they moved to Iron Acton to take over Fursman's

Stores. Both of them worked in the shop. Bunny carried on his father's tradition cooking and curing his own ham and maturing the cheese for the shop. Marjorie supplied the women of the village with drapery, from cotton to sewing items, which were placed in little drawers. In those days many customers used to save money on Christmas Club Cards and sometimes they might ask to have little debts "put on the book" and pay them off gradually. Later on Marjorie worked for many years at the Brooke Clinics (for family planning) in Bristol, while also Helping in the shop and running a home.



The opening of Tesco in nearby Yate affected many small businesses in the area and it gradually put paid to the viability of a village store and Bunny, reluctantly, closed his shop in 14 February 1984 when he retired.

Bunny passed away in 1997 and Marjorie then lived on her own in their house from that time. She insisted on being independent and tried to live life to its best. Shortly after her 90th birthday she was able to fulfill one of her dreams and fly over the Cotswolds (thanks to an unusual birthday present) when she went on a flight in a glider. She was quoted in a local paper describing it as a "wonderful day and thoroughly enjoyable".

Marjorie enjoyed her lovely garden, her little vegetable plot and cooking or baking as much as she could. She used to prepare crab apple jam and put it in jars to be given to friends. She liked to be helpful in every way she could so you could find her knitting clothes for premature babies or knitting breasts for UWE midwifery students to assist their studies. Marjorie would always enjoy the company of family and friends and she had also been helpful and comforting whenever they needed a sympathetic ear.

Marjorie left a son, Patrick, a grandson, Ben and a great-grandson, Barr Her funeral took place on 5 July at Westerleigh Crematorium and was attended by many people. Her friends and neighbours say she has been an inspiration as well as a friend. She will be missed by many.

We have already held a bring and buy cake stall, a skittles evening and a garden party – each one of these events has been very enjoyable and successful. In December we will be presenting the County Air Ambulance Trust with a cheque for the amount we have raised from our fund-raising throughout the year.

Our Ladies Club annual evening took place on Monday 4 July. This year the destination we chose was Dewstoke Gardens and we then enjoyed refreshments at Dewstoke Golf Club.

BRISTOL RELAY FOR LIFE - 2 AND 3 JULY 2011

Earlier this year it became obvious that the organizers of Bristol's Race for Life had not consulted those of us from Iron Acton who normally take part! As a result they had inconveniently clashed their date with the Proms in the Meadow. This led to something of a dilemma - should we quietly forget about our fundraising this year or think of something else to do?

A year off was on the cards until someone (I'll name no names here!) mentioned another Cancer Research event called Relay for Life. We investigated further and found that the event was handily located at the Yate Outdoor Sports Centre and had thoughtfully managed to avoid any other Iron Acton event. Encouraged by what we had read we registered our team and Acton Aliance was born!

Relay for life is a 24 hour event and requires at least one member of each team to be walking throughout the 24 hours. With a dawning realization that some of us were not as fit as we'd like to be it quickly became obvious that the more team members we had the less walking we would have to do. Initially we had 4 or 5 team members but, to my surprise, as word of our challenge spread, we were approached again and again by people who wanted to take part. In the end we had 10 adults and 9 children registered to our team.

The idea of Relay for Life is not just to raise sponsorship for the event itself but to raise funds throughout the year and we got off to a flying start when Lisa Hatherall organized a coffee morning on our behalf. It was a lovely morning with coffee, cakes, games, a raffle and a book sale and it was brilliantly supported

so many people. Lisa raised £315 for our team - a wonderful start.

Our next fund-raising event was a Strawberry Tea organized by Jayne MacIver and held in Rona and Barrie Wright's garden. The afternoon of the tea was warm and bright and, as school finished, the garden was swamped by hungry schoolchildren and their parents joining other friends and supporters.

So many supported us that a fantastic £415 was raised.

As a result of this fundraising and each team member's own sponsorship we had already raised over £1300 as the day of the Relay approached.

Saturday, 2 July dawned dry and bright, with the prospect of warm weather for the whole weekend. In good spirits we arrived early at the YOSC to set up "base camp" in the centre of the 400m sports track. It was soon obvious that many of the other teams were old hands at the event as their team camps had a military organization which, I think it's fair to say, ours lacked!

At midday the event started with everyone walking the first lap - led by cancer survivors. In the bright sunshine and with music playing there was a fun, carnival atmosphere which lasted throughout the day. At various

accompanied by our team song "bring me sunshine" and a fair imitation of the classic Morecombe and Wise dance. Throughout Saturday afternoon we were also running a soft toy tombola stall to raise more money for our team. It was only at the end of the afternoon that we realized a large proportion of the soft toys had been won back by the younger Acton Alliance team members!

Having mentioned them I would now like to say a few more words about our junior team members - they were brilliant! Every one of them walked their socks off - quite literally in some cases as the weekend was extremely hot. All entered into the spirit of the event with enthusiasm and enjoyment. The organisers had provided everyone taking part with a long piece of string and at the start/finish line there was a large bucket full of beads. As each lap was completed a bead was added to the string to keep a tally of the number of laps walked. This simple idea really attracted the children and their number of beads grew much faster than the adults!

During the evening we were joined by our families and enjoyed a team BBQ and a glass or two of wine (a necessary sleep aid for those of us due to camp out overnight! Then, as it started to get dark, the Candles of Hope were lit alongside the track. These were candles that had been dedicated to loved ones. This was an extremely moving part of the event and it was a time to reflect on why we were all there, to remember lost ones and those still fighting their battle with cancer. On the embankment above the track the candles spelt out one word - HOPE.

Gradually darkness descended and there were fewer people on the track. The resident DJ turned off his amp and the team night owls started their laps. The rest of us tried to sleep. A clear evening turned into a clear night and the temperature fell dramatically. It was a chill, dewy night and by 4.30 am we were all glad to see the sunrise - despite the lack of sleep.

However the glorious morning sunshine soon warmed us and as fresh team members with fresh legs arrived we set about the final hours. A combination of miles already walked, lack of sleep and the heat meant that the walking was tougher than the previous day but the last few hours passed quickly until, just before midday, we all gathered at the start line for the final lap of the event and then it was all over.

What an experience! At times intensely emotional, but always in wonderful company and with the knowledge that what we were doing really matters. Our team total of £1300 (with some sponsorship still to come) is way beyond my expectation when we first thought "how about doing Relay for Life this year?" In all, the Bristol Relay for Life will have raised over £28,000 for Cancer Research UK.

I can't finish without some words of thanks - to so many people. Firstly, my grateful thanks go to everyone who has put their hand in their pocket or purse to support us over the last few months. Thanks also to everyone who came and not only encouraged us at the relay but even joined us on many of our laps. My thanks also go to our back-up team of spouses who put up tents, fed and watered us and looked after the children we abandoned for 24 hours!

But the final thanks go to my fantastic team-mates without whom none of this would have happened: Jill Bendeaux, Pippa Cook, Olivia Cowell, Rosie Haselhan, Nikki, Ollie and George Johnson, Jayne, Chelsea, Izzy and Amy MacIver, Natalie McPartland, Sarah & REllie Ridler, Amanda & Lissy Sccott, Heather Tillotson and Sandie Wiggins.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE



IRON ACTON PARISH COUNCIL

New Councillors - The Local Council Elections took place on 5 May 2011, with Pat and Dave Hockey (Frampton Cotterell Ward) and Howard Gawler (Ladden Brook Ward) being re-elected as our representatives on South Gloucestershire Council. The 2 Parish Council wards were uncontested, in that there were no more names put forward than there were seats available. In fact one seat remained vacant immediately following the election for the East Ward. This has now been filled through co-opting a willing applicant! The new line-up of Iron Acton Parish Councillors is as follows:-

<u>Latteridge</u> - The Parish Council was approached at the end of March by a company called AEE who were proposing to develop approximately 14-15 hectares of farm land in the Latteridge area for a solar farm. The solar farm would generate enough electricity for 780 standard homes, and AEE wished to hold a public exhibition and give a short presentation to the Parish Council prior to their official planning application. Generous subsidies had been available via the Government for sustainable energy projects, however at short notice these subsidies were withdrawn. Subsequently AEE cancelled their public exhibition.

North Road - A new mains gas supply will be installed along a section of North Road from the North Road/ Iron Acton Way junction to North Road Primary School to facilitate the new heating system (which is part of the refurbishment work currently being undertaken) Additional work includes completely new electrics and a new roof.

<u>Nibley Lane</u> - Following numerous complaints about speeding traffic and the suggested increase in the number of cars using Nibley Lane, South Gloucestershire Council will be installing a speed advisory sign at the entrance to the lane. This sign will be in situ for approximately one month prior to the start

of the school summer holidays.

OFER

<u>Parish Meadow</u> - The Parish Council has undertaken some extensive clearance works in the Meadow over the past couple of months. The tennis courts have been swept and weeded and the bushes behind the courts have been cut back. The stream has also been cleared of debris and one of the tall Alder trees has been dead-wooded.

<u>Footpaths</u> - Numerous footpaths criss-cross the parish, and are frequently walked by parishioners. Should anyone walking a public footpath come across any problems with things such as obstructions, overgrown weeds or brambles, please contact the Clerk. Alternatively you can also speak to the South Gloucestershire Council Public Rights of Way team on 01454 863646, or email rightsofway@southglos.gov.uk.

<u>Village Green</u> - As a rural parish we are fortunate to have a great deal of open space for recreational use and enjoyment. None more important than the two village greens within the village and at Latteridge. Village Greens are protected by law, and as custodians the Parish Council is legally bound to ensure they remain open and unhindered for all to enjoy. The parking of cars on the village green (even with just two wheels), driving across the Green and the placing of refuse skips is in breach of section 12 of the Enclosures Act of 1857 and section 29 of the Commons Act 1876. The Byelaws for the Village Green (dated 1949) also state that "a person

shall not on the ground willfully obstruct, disturb, interrupt, or annoy any other person in the proper use of the ground". What about May Day, we hear some of you saying? The fact is that village greens were created and encouraged for just this type of event! The Parish Council's hands are tied in that we are obliged to uphold legislation regarding Village Greens and duty bound to ensure that the integrity of the Green is maintained. The Parish Council has erected three additional 'no parking' signs as a first step to protect the Green and will be monitoring the situation.

<u>Traffic Management Review</u> - Parishioners will remember that back in 2009 the X27 bus service was withdrawn from running through the High Street because of 'inappropriate parking' of cars. Subsequently the Parish Council canvassed residents of the village (Chilwood Close, Algars Drive, Nibley Lane, village side of Wotton Road, High Street, Park Street, Village Green and Station Road) to see whether a Traffic Management Review of the area was in order. The majority of responses received thought this would be a good idea to try and solve this issue. South Glos Council has now supplied the Parish Council with their preliminary findings and suggested solutions and these will be discussed at future Parish Council meetings following a site meeting with South Gloucestershire Council Highways Engineers.

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
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
