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
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#### **Acton Aid**


Acton Aid Chairman's Dinner took place at the Parish Hall on Friday 10<sup>th</sup> February, where Cherry Picked Catering served-up a delicious four-course dinner – our thanks to Conrad Lynton-Jenkins and his team. Out-going Chairman Gareth Wynne-Hughes included a quiz of Acton Aid trivia from the last year in his speech. With perhaps a sign of things to come, incoming Chairman Peter Foote read his speech from a large, inflatable banana! It is sure to be an interesting year in Acton Aid.

Throughout the last year, in addition to raising funds for use in the Parish, Acton Aid has raised £850 for Action for Blind People. Two representatives from the charity joined us for the Chairman's Dinner and gave a speech outlining how that funding will be used in the local community.

Acton Aid is currently busy with a number of events. We have joined with other Parish organisations to make arrangements for May Day and the celebration of the Diamond Jubilee in June. We are also hoping to enjoy a tour and talk at the Cotswold Spring Brewery in the near future.

Proms in the Meadow will take place on Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> July. The theme this year will set us up for the London Olympics. The Bristol Millennium Orchestra will be joined by soprano Charlotte Newstead, all-female close harmony singing group Fascinating Rhythm and the Castle School Panache Steel Band. The Kathryn Hurley Dance Academy and the Stapleton School of Dancing will also be appearing. The event will open with a performance by Olivia Cowell from Iron Acton. Tickets will be available at The Lamb Inn.

Since the last edition of Focal Poyntz, Acton Aid has been busy with a number of events. We enjoyed a bumper Firework Display on Bonfire Night which was helped by perfect conditions. Later in November, seven intrepid members of Acton Aid travelled to Berlin for our annual cultural trip. In December, Acton Aid distributed Christmas Hampers to pensioners across the Parish and helped to staff the bar at the New Year's Eve party at the Parish Hall.






We managed to make a small profit on the night so if anyone would like to organise a party this year please let us know and we can pass on the float to help you get off the ground.

From their street alone I collected over £200 and the cup is awarded to the highest amount street collection in this area.



#### **North Road Primary School**

Happy new year from everyone at North Road Primary.

The term started as busily as it had finished. After a great deal of fund raising organised by the Friends of School, we were able to have a new outdoor learning classroom on our playground. This gives the children some shade in the summer and shelter in the winter. The new gazebo has tables and seats which are being used for creative activities at play and lunchtimes as well as a black board and mirror which all the children are enjoying. The far side has some pipes which can be used to race cars, balls and water down, classes will also be able to go outside for lessons in the better weather. Thank you to everyone who has supported one of our school events which helped raise the money for this new exciting learning area.



Brimsham Green Secondary School continues to support our PE curriculum by providing us with young coaches. The children love being taught by experts and are gaining lots of new skills. Last week also saw the children taking part in a Boccia tournament. Boccia is a game in the Paralympics, similar to bowling. The children all had a session on the rules and skills required, followed by a tournament a few days later. Thank you to Mrs Johnson for organising this through our PE links with other local schools.

Ten Year 5 and 6 pupils have started practising for their performance as part of the South Gloucestershire Colston Hall choir. They will be performing in March at the Colston Hall. This opportunity comes up every two years and is a great experience for young singers.

We have invited lots of visitors to assemblies this term. Barnardo's came to tell us about their 2012 care and share appeal. The children all had to be kind and caring at home and at school and design a badge to remind people to be kind. They also raised over £150 for the charity. Next week the Rotary club are coming to tell us about their Polio appeal.

We continue to take the children on lots of trips to enhance their learning. Class 1 went to Slimbridge to see all the different wildlife and Class 3 and 4 went to Cardiff Castle. Class 2 have visited Yate Heritage Centre to look at their toy collection and the Teddy Bear factory at Cribbs Causeway to see how modern day teddy bears are made. The children also celebrated Thinking day by coming to school in their Rainbow, Beaver, Cub or Brownie uniform and singing camp fire songs whilst toasting marshmallows.

As the summer fast approaches we have our residential trips to look forward, our whole school trip to Puzzlewood and our Olympic themed sports day as well as commemorating the Diamond Jubilee.





#### The Actonians

The pantomime season is now passed and we would wish to give many thanks to all of you who came and supported us in late November/early December. People who came and saw it reported very favourably on the evening and we enjoyed pretty good houses for most of the seven nights that we ran it. Many thanks also to the young people from Kathryn Hurley's Dance School who added youth and energy in their 2 dance numbers to the show. It was great to have them involved and we look forward to future such collaborations.

Our One-Act festival entry is another Shakespeare-related production developed by Ann Aplin called "The Seven Ages of Women". It has a cast of 5 women who are gathered together in The Bard's Bar with one man as the waiter. It provides an opportunity to switch from modern dialogue into Shakespeare's and play Lady Capulet, Nurse, Juliet, Desdemona, Emilia, Katherine, Bianca, Beatrice, Cleopatra, Charmian, the Duchess of York and Katherine of Aragon - while the chap plays Lord Capulet, Baptista Minola, Benedict, Bolingbroke and Henry VIII. It sounds an intriguing mix of styles and characters and again, like Paddington Tank, is tagged with the RSC Open Stages logo to celebrate 50 years of the RSC. It is very likely that it will go on to the second round, since it is the only Shakespeare-related production in the festival (which will be on April 14<sup>th</sup> at the Olympus Theatre on The Wise Campus at Filton College).

"Paddington Tank" - to be staged at the end of May (23<sup>rd</sup>-26<sup>th</sup> May) at 19.30 in the Parish Hall - is a new venture being developed by Jim Sinkinson, assisted by Rachel Taylor. It takes the form of a significant update of the Henry IV part 1 story based in boardroom battles and family feuds. We have already benefited from a couple of workshops provided through the good offices of the RSC and it is looking to be both an exciting and innovative project for the group to be involved in. Actonians used to have a Junior (secondary School) section which met on a Wednesday evening in the Hall prior to the main rehearsal, but the lack of available adult leadership led to its demise a few years ago. However, it can now be absolutely confirmed that Lizzie New has started a new "Junior Actonians" group on Wednesday evenings running from 18.00-19.30 hrs at The Parish Hall. A committed group of about 12 young people have so far started. The youngest members are 10 years of age and the upper limit is 18....for all those budding young performers in the village, do come along on a Wednesday evening and try it out!

The hot-off-the-press news is that our production in the autumn is likely to be "The 39 Steps" – currently wooing audiences in the West End. Liz and Rona helped a charity pack Christmas boxes for sending to underprivileged children in Eastern Europe. Liz in particular had knitted a lot of babies' clothes and was interested in seeing the process of actually getting the items off to their destination. Both said it had been an extremely rewarding experience.

We began this year with a creative evening when our own Cilla Rochford helped us to make greetings cards. It was testimony to her meticulous preparation in providing plenty of the 'twiddly' bits that the results were all pretty good. Cilla kindly donated her fee to a charity called Mary's Meals, which provides a meal a day (usually the only one), for a child in need in schools in the poorest countries of the world, thus ensuring some kind of basic education as well as guaranteed nourishment.

In February we had a presentation from two local serving magistrates which was informative, interesting and fun. We engaged in some role play whereby a woman accused of shoplifting was questioned by both defence and prosecution counsel and evidence given by a store detective. The rest of the group had to decide on the guilt or innocence of the hapless Jenny M and members were very much evenly split as the case had been so cleverly scripted with many different aspects to consider. On the request of the speakers a donation was made to Victim Support.

Before the end of March we will have taken part in the WI Olympic Torch relay. The idea is that the 'torch' is carried and handed on from one group to another in as many varied ways as possible. At the time of writing the plan is that we receive the torch from Coalpit Heath WI in a vintage car and hand it on to Chipping Sodbury via horseback (thanks to Catherine)!

Our book club is currently flourishing with members meeting in the White Hart and we are introducing a produce stall at meetings whereby members can bring in anything they would like to sell on. This is likely to be particularly popular in the summer when there is a glut of home grown fruit and veg. 
#### Iron Acton C of E VC Primary School



This is a letter addressed to the village received from a well remembered friend Mrs Joy Waker.

Dear Friends in the Parish of St James the Less

Although I keep in touch with several people especially at Christmas I have been told that some others have kindly been asking "Where is Mrs Waker now and what are the family doing?", so here is a quick update.

I am living happily in the very friendly Dorset village of Sixpenny Handley and keep very busy with a wide range of tasks and interests. Here in the village I am treasurer of the thriving WI, arrange the church cleaning rota, (it will probably surprise those who know me well to learn that I now help with the flowers too), clean brass in 3 churches but there is nothing quite as splendid as the candelabra at St James the Less, and I make even more jams and marmalades than I did at Iron Acton.

My garden provides me with both work and pleasure and in the fine weather I often go over to Ann's house about 2 miles away to help with their huge garden. Their home is deeply tucked away in the countryside, so quiet and peaceful that when I am working there the deer often creep out from the woods and hedgerows to see what I am doing.

We have a good range of shops in the village and a doctors' surgery and a fairly good daytime bus service to Salisbury and Weymouth, with a once a week bus to Bournemouth. The journey to Weymouth takes nearly 2 hours but passes through some lovely countryside and the ancient town of Dorchester. Visitors are always surprised and delighted to find that the route also goes round the royal Corps of Signals Camp. The gates are unlocked for the bus to go through. It and the passengers are inspected by a soldier who then rides shotgun on the bus until it is time to unlock the gate to let us out. One American lady thought it was so exciting that she began taking photographs. She narrowly escaped being arrested. The soldier consulted higher authority and after some time it was decided to delete her photos and let her continue.

When I go to Weymouth I usually try to meet up with George and Jenny Riddle and we exchange any news we have gleamed from Iron Acton.

Many people say that Dorset is 50 years behind the times. Those of us who live here say "Long may it continue to be so". We have no motorways and no really fast roads, just plenty of narrow twisting ones instead. In most of the villages you get a police caution if you go even slightly over 20 mph.

Just over a year ago Peter, Lucy, Sam and Molly moved to Compton Abbas near Shaftesbury which is only about 25 minutes drive from here but all on above mentioned very winding roads with a couple of incredibly steep hills thrown in and where you never know when deer are going to wander across from one wooded hillside to the other.

Sam and Molly are thoroughly enjoying their new schools and Sam pursues his interest in swimming, running, hockey and cricket both for school and local clubs.

Ann's and Toby's boys are now tall young men. No babysitting needed as it was when I first moved here, instead they now look after me. Ben is a rugby playing archaeologist, Martin is ready Biochemistry at Oxford University - where he has taken up rowing and Jonathan is just applying to universities for engineering.

David and Sallyann with their children Michael, James and Megan live in Buckinghamshire not far from where Tony and I started our married life. Even little Megan, now 3, is at school. How the time flies. They come back to Iron Acton more frequently than any of us in order to visit Sallyann's parents so you are quite likely to see them from time to time.

They always try to come to the May Day celebrations and were delighted to be able to attend the Christingle Service on one of their day visits.

A big thank you to all who write to me and good wishes to everyone.

#### **Annual Parish Meeting**

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> May 2012 in Iron Acton Parish Hall commencing at 8.00pm. All parishioners are invited. At this meeting, the Parish Council will present the annual accounts for approval as well as a report of activities for the previous twelve months.

#### **Cardboard Recycling Bags**

There are still a few green cardboard recycling bags left. On the subject of recycling, some parishioners mentioned that their white plastic recycling bags are beginning to disintegrate. If anyone needs a new bag they should contact South Gloucestershire Council directly and speak with the Streetcare Department on 01454 868000, who will provide a new bag.

#### **Core Strategy**

Regarding South Gloucestershire Council's Core Strategy document, the Parish Council responded in detail as follows:-

- The appraisal carried out by South Gloucestershire Council of the Engine Common area recognised that every aspect in the assessment proved to have a "major negative effect" on the area, community, landscape, infrastructure, wildlife, general wellbeing and health of inhabitants.
- Any development in the Engine Common area, apart from being outside the currently
  defined development boundary, would not be connected to the village of Iron Acton or to
  Yate, due to the intervening mainline railway and primary distributor route. The current
  North Road/Iron Acton Way traffic light junction is already at full capacity during rush
  hours and frequently backs up to the village of Iron Acton.

- The current drainage and sewerage system in the Engine Common area is full to capacity and additional facilities will need to be installed before any further houses are built in the North Yate area.
- Any large housing development would swamp the existing, unique rural character of the Engine Common area within the parish of Iron Acton.
- The Parish Council is aware that there is an on-line petition to protect the rural aspects
  of Engine Common. This petition has been instigated by local Engine Common
  residents and has been signed by over 250 people who live in, or use the area. This
  petition is supported by the local MP Steve Webb, and has received media coverage.
- The Parish Council fully supports South Gloucestershire Council's preferred approach to support communities in the preparation of parish and neighbourhood plans, as per the Localism Act

#### Land off Broad Lane

The Parish Council has received notification of a planning application to develop the land to the side of the Fox Pub on Broad Lane. Originally, planning permission had been granted on this site to build two new office blocks. The new development will consist of 14 two, three and four bedroomed houses on the site with associated parking. The developer, Newland Homes has contacted local residents to ask their opinions and presented their plans at the Parish Council's January meeting. Broadly speaking the Parish Council is supportive of this application.

#### Parish Meadow

The Parish Council has formed a Parish Meadow Committee that has been tasked with developing a schedule of maintenance for the Meadow, as well as looking into grant opportunities. The Parish Meadow Committee consists of Councillors Bob Sheppard, Lynne Blanchard, Chris Heal, Andy Tillotson and Peter Huish. Dates and agendas of their meetings will be published on the parish notice boards and the Parish Council website, and will be treated in the same way as a normal Parish Council meeting, giving parishioners the opportunity to put across their views and suggestions.

#### Vacancy

The Parish Council is seeking a new Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer to replace Mrs Evans who has recently resigned. Advertisements will be placed on the parish notice boards, the Parish Council website, as well as the local press. 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
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


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#### **Diamond Jubilee Family Day**
