Allotments

Early in 2012, and with the encouragement of the Parish Council, the Iron Acton Allotment Association was formed, with the overall aim of helping the Parish Council to maintain and improve the standard of the more than 40 allotments at Nibley Lane and Station Road.

An interim Committee was formed, a Constitution drawn up and a good relationship with the Parish Council established. The Allotment Association's first AGM was held on 12th October in the Marshall Rooms.

There is general agreement that the last 6 months has seen a vast improvement in both allotment gardens, with virtually all plots under cultivation. Despite a late start to the season, there has been an abundance of crops.

Looking to the future, the intention is to continue to harness the enthusiasm of all allotment holders, with specific plans to:

- · Provide equipment and storage for the upkeep of communal areas
- · Make provision for the exchange of plants and ideas
- · Offer a seed purchase and garden provision service

There is currently a long waiting list for an allotment, but parishioners have priority and so if you are keen to get digging, please contact the Clerk, Donna Beal.

Western Power Distribution

A phone call by the clerk was made to Western Power distribution and a long conversation held with the contact centre. The Parish Council advised that they had received complaints into the amount of power cuts which had taken place lately within the parish and requested information into this. Following the reports it was advised that there had been 10 power cuts in the last 3 months. These were caused by the high volt 11000 line which brings power into Iron Acton on an automated line of which affects 465 houses. The main cause of the problem is usually trees tripping the line. A free service is offered to keep the trees 6ft clear of the lines. The last trim was recorded for April 2013. I have requested that this is again looked at due to the rapid growth of trees, bushes and shrubs recently. I was advised that when the fault develops it is changed to a secondary line on an automated trip switch but this can cause dips in the power. A report will be logged from my call and passed onto the local area manager and a request to have this looked into and reports gathered from the engineers that attended. I have requested that any information found to be passed onto me. I was also advised that if any parishioners who are affected know of any over hanging trees etc close to the main power line to contact them direct to report tell no: 0800 365 900.

Meetings

The Parish Council usually meets on the third Monday of each month, except for August. Meetings are held on a rotational basis between the Marshall Rooms in the High Street, North Road School Hall and the Parish Hall. All meetings commence at 7.30pm and parishioners are welcome to attend to raise any matters of concern under Public Participation at the beginning of each meeting.

Agendas for forthcoming meetings are posted on the Notice Boards (located in the High Street and North Road) giving three clear days before the next meeting and on the website. An item may be added to forthcoming meeting agenda for formal decision. However, it is advisable to speak with one of your Parish Councillors, or the Clerk beforehand. The best way to understand what is happening in your parish is to come along to Parish Council meetings.



Extracts From How I Started National Service 1960 -1962

Day Nine - After this morning's muster parade we were marched to the armoury for the first time to collect our rifles. These were Lee-Enfield rifles and there were three detachable parts - magazine, bolt and bayonet. These vital pieces were always removed for storage in one's locker, the inactivated wooden remainder being kept in a stack alongside one's bed.

The days continued with drill exercises, dental check-ups, a talk about spending our 15 shillings per week wisely, muster parades, boxing in the gym, rifle drills, PE, rugby - one day was almost the same as the next. On Sundays we were allowed a certain amount of freedom (within the camp) but were expected to be seen bulling our kit every time the NCOs approached!

We were also given lessons in letter writing. We were then instructed to write a letter home telling our mothers how much we were enjoying army life. In an interview by Colonel Carstairs to analyse my chances of passing the Officer Selection Board - he didn't think I had much of a chance unless I changed my attitude!

Day Thirty Five - During the usual muster parade there was a noticeable easing up of the shouting and bawling, the NCOs were becoming more friendly! It was the first day on the square when none of us were "picked up" for anything. Following the foot and rifle drill we were marched to the camp cinema to be shown how to assemble and disassemble a Bren gun.

Day Thirty Six - the usual trio came into the billet from the normal 'rubbishing' of the billet and kit lay-out, but all we got were helpful comments from the NCOs and praise from Lt. Handley. We were actually rewarded with a 20 minute NAAFI break.

Day Thirty Seven - After lunch, in our best clobber, we were assembled for squad and platoon photographs outside the billet.

The Passing Out Parade went off without incident and, after being dismissed we were allowed to seek out our relatives who had been watching the big show. I found my wife and mother sitting at a table adorned with tea, cakes and salmon and cucumber sandwiches. (How come cup cakes were there fifty years before they were invented? They were both shocked by my appearance, but a greater surprise was in store. They weren't hungry and I was invited to "tuck in" - I was (and am) a slow eater, preferring to talk my way through meals. I polished off the lot on the table in under a minute - the look on their faces was one I shall never forget.

As platoon commander, Lt. Handley's PR function was to circulate and obtain proud parental views. He asked my wife "Has he changed?" Diplomatically, she pointed out how pale and emaciated I looked and with close-cropped hair looked like a convict. He just smiled.

Thus ended the worst 37 days of my life. Despite my appearance, I have never been fitter before or since. I went home for a weekend's leave wondering what the Army had in store for me next.

Yate Minor Injuries Unit - Do You Know Who We Are and What We Do?

I'm sure many of you have heard about or even visited Yate Minor Injuries Unit as a patient. If you have had the misfortune to suffer an injury and have availed yourself of our services, I do hope we treated you well and you were satisfied with the outcome.

I would like to take this opportunity to advise the Parish as to what we 'do' at Yate MIU. Firstly, we are not a GP Surgery therefore any 'illness' related complaints and anything not remotely an injury should not present to our doors. Please don't be offended if you are advised to see your GP. We run a specific service and are trying to minimise inappropriate attendances.

So, we are open Mondays to Fridays from 0830 hours until 1930 hours. Saturdays and Sundays we are open from 1000 hours until 1400 hours though it is advisable to attend early at the weekend as the doors close if we are inundated with patients.

Presenting complaints that we can see and treat are;

- Minor head injuries with or without loss of consciousness
- Minor joint injuries such as ankle/wrist/knee/shoulder strains, sprains, dislocations and fractures
- Minor back injuries
- Minor facial injuries
- Wounds
- Minor eye injuries and eye complaints
- Bites insect/animal/human (!)
- Burns
- Nosebleeds
- Foreign bodies
- Essentially any minor injury that has been sustained within the last 2 weeks

If your complaint occurred over 2 weeks' ago or is longstanding, we would advise you to see your GP.

There is a misconception that if someone has a fracture, we cannot plaster or manage the injury. This is not the case. As would happen in any Emergency Department, we can diagnose fractures, initiate management and commence the appropriate follow-up. We are able to refer onwards and we have direct access to a variety of ongoing care providers.

Notably, our X-ray facilities are weekdays only from 0900 hours generally until 1700 hours.

We are a small but strong clinical team at Yate MIU consisting of 5 Emergency Nurse Practitioners (ENPs), 2 Nurses and 1 Health Care Assistant. We come from a variety of backgrounds but the Emergency Care setting predominates. Our Lead Practitioner is a Paediatric Specialist.

So, if you have an injury that you feel meets the above criteria, do come and see us and give us your feedback afterwards. If you have any queries our phone number is 01454 315355 – ask for the Minor Injuries Team.



There will be no charge.

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
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
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
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North Road Community Primary School

Chiming alongside 4 other bells. The ringing in our ears seemed to go on and on. The view of the City of London was spectacular from this great height. Here are a few quick interesting facts:

The Elizabeth Tower is over 96 metres high and 12 metres square with 11 floors inside.

Each clock dial is 7 metres in diameter and illuminated each night by 28 energy efficient light bulbs giving out 85 watts.

Each minutes hand travels a distance of about 100 miles a year.

Big Ben - the great bell measure 2.7mts in diameter, 2.2mts in height and weighs 13.7 tonnes.



Ponderings of Chairman Pete

So do you think your Parish Council is a joke? Or secretive? I'd love to tell you LOTS of things about your Parish Council, but here I can only tell you some. Anything I say will be meant with good motives for Iron Acton Parish and is hopefully polite and respectful. You have to realise that if I say something that someone else thinks is untrue then I may have to defend myself in a legal case, and some things I can't say because of other legal constraints.

So what do I want to tell you? Well firstly, do you know what your Parish Council is? It's 9 unpaid volunteers 4 from Iron Acton East Ward and 5 from Iron Acton Ward. We are chosen by the voters every 4 years. From amongst ourselves we vote in a Chairman and a Vice Chairman, once a year in May. We are supported by a part-time paid Clerk, who provides us with advice about what is right and wrong, and who carries out all our written work of all kinds.

The current set of Councillors was elected in 2011. When I say elected, that is technically what happened. What actually happened is that 8 adults from around 2,000 voters in the Parish offered themselves as willing to serve as Councillors, so they all got elected unopposed. To cover the remaining vacancy we are allowed to co-opt someone, so Councillor Tillotson was co-opted.

I've said this before, and I will continue to say it - the Parish gets the Councillors it deserves and that includes me. I don't think I'm perfect, and I am sure that others in the Parish could probably do better than me. But have those people offered themselves to the voters? It would be so easy to take the line that approximately 1990 people in Iron Acton Parish have taken and think 'I'll let some other fool do it'. Certainly, every Councillor you currently have is there because they want to serve the public in Iron Acton, and they think that they will do the right thing as each issue arises. The thing is, if you think they are wrong either in deed, motive or rational thought, then you need to let them know. You can do that by engaging with your Councillors, or turning up to meetings and speaking in public participation, or by standing or voting in elections.

Do you know that every Parish Council meeting is open to the public? The only exception is the parts of meetings where on very rare occasions the subject is confidential. Confidential means because of legal constraints, not because the Parish Council feels like it.

From my own perspective as a Councillor, I think it is much better when voters tell me what they think, when they've read the agenda and wish to contribute, when they turn up at the meetings. It doesn't happen very often.

One thing that I am very aware of, and it is in my conscious thought every day, is that at the last two Annual Parish Meetings the voters said clearly to us that they want to see squabbles put behind us and that they want us to get on, without nonsense, on the things that the Parish needs. In my role as Chairman that is what I strive for in all my Parish Council work.

However in my personal opinion it sometimes appears that not very Councillor has really taken that to heart, even though they all say that they have. Ultimately that is for you, the voters, to do your homework on and to decide which of the Councillors you wish to continue to represent and serve you.

Something else I don't think many people are aware of, is can a Councillor be removed or otherwise punished? The short answer is not really. On the one extreme, if someone is in prison they cannot act as a Councillor. At the milder end of the spectrum, if a complaint is made and upheld, the Parish Council can do nothing about any outcome, apart from deciding to not let that Councillor continue on any committees or sub-communities, but it has no effect on the main Parish Council meetings.

There has been some press activity lately about a Councillor who had an adverse finding in a standards investigation. The Parish Council condemned any breach of the Code of Conduct, and that is about as much as we can do. Whenever the Parish Council becomes aware of such breaches, it is likely to make a similar response. But the Parish Council does not always know of such breaches because usually the results are sent to the complainant and the defendant, and the Parish Council doesn't get told that there is even a complaint, much less the result.

On the other hand, the Parish Council doesn't always manage to find smart ways to let people know about the good things it or individual Councillors has done, or why it has made a particular decision - apart from if people are present at meetings, or course. We are hoping to make this better by starting a 'Chairman's Page' on the website soon.

In conclusion, I want to be positive about the Parish Council - particularly I want you to have enjoyed reading this article in Focal Poyntz and for it to provoke some good thought and some good action. I want to see Iron Acton Parish engage with its Parish Council and for the Parish to have a good choice of candidates at the next election in May 2015.

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
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


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
