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

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

Iron Acton Community Cinema

Yes it's back and it's better than ever.

Iron Acton Community Cinema will:

Have its own equipment - with the help of South Glos County Council and supported by Iron Acton Parish Council we will purchase our own screen, projector and sound system.

Operate under an umbrella licence and therefore be run as a club with membership and a chance to vote for the films of your choice.

Offer free showings at the Children's matinee for children and adults.

Show recent DVD releases.

Offer two showings per month - afternoon and evening.

Offer refreshments at both performances, including a bar in the evening.

Be located in the Parish Hall, Iron Acton.

Start up again in October 2014 and run to March 2015.

Last year we trialled the Community Cinema and hopefully you came along to one of the showings. Despite a good turnout at most events we found we were constantly running at a loss due to the expense of hiring equipment and films and paying for licences and a projectionist and despite the support of our own Acton Aid.

We decided to review the operation and during the last few months have been talking to various local supporting bodies about an alternative approach. We think we've come up with a solution which will enable us to keep your Community Cinema running and we hope you will be able to come along and support it.

What does being 'a club' mean?

It means we will be restricted on how we can both promote and charge for the films we show.

Charging

We are going to offer membership to the club

The charge will be £25 per year (6 months of shows) per adult.

This will need to be paid for in advance.

We may offer the chance for temporary membership at the event but this will be limited to just two shows, per season, per adult and will cost substantially more per show.

All attendance at the matinee showing is free.

Children under 16, who attend any evening performance, will be charged £3.50 per film.

Promotion

We will not be able to advertise the films we show on any public media

So we need everyone to give us their email address so we can let you know about the films

Keep us up to date if it changes because this is how we will let you know what films are being shown and when.

Firstly, thanks for reading this far! There was a lot to tell you. Now it's your turn. Here's what you need to do to become a member.

We'll send your membership card to you within 28 days of your cheque clearing.

Extracts From My Secret Diaries – King Henry VIII – (1491 : 1991)

Part 2

In 1513 two events took place that defined the early years of my reign. James IV broke the Treaty of Perpetual Peace and invaded the Northern Orders of England where the English and Scottish armies met at the Battle of Flodden in which the entire nobility of Scotland was wiped out, including King James himself. Indeed, Katherine even sent me a piece of his blood soaked tunic, while at the same time I invaded France and a battle called "The Battle of the Spurs" too place, so called because as soon as the French army saw the English army, they spurred their horses and ran away. A habit that the French seem to have even to this day.

King Louis died several months after Mary's marriage took place, and to my utter surprise and anger she secretly married my best friend Charles Brandon, Duke of Suffolk. To do this without my permission was technically considered high treason, as any member of the nobility had to have the Monarch's blessing beforehand. I banished them both to Brandon's estates in Suffolk for two years and he had to pay an enormous fine before they were welcomed back to Court.

At last in 1516 a surviving child was born, a daughter, Mary, and to my eternal shame she became infamously known to history as Bloody Mary. I believe you have a modern day drink named after her.

I desperately needed a son to succeed me, after all a woman could not inherit the throne because that would lead to civil war as had happened two hundred years before Matilda.

As tradition dictates, I embarked on an affair with one of my courtier's daughters, Bessie Blount, and in 1518 a surviving son was born. We called him Henry FitzRoy, this last name is given to all illegitimate offspring born of the Monarch. However, for this very reason he could not inherit my throne.

Katherine kept falling pregnant and no further child survived – what was wrong? My conscience would soon reveal to me the truth of the matter.

In 1519 one of the biggest diplomatic events in history too place, "The Field of the Cloth of Gold". A meeting between myself and Francis the First of France. Wolsey excelled himself with his flair for organisation and statesmanship. The meeting took place in a large field just outside Calais, France and lasted ten days. Both the English and French trying to outdo each other in what amounted to diplomatic one-upmanship.

It was while this event took place that a meeting arose between Wolsey and the Bishop of Tarbe. The Bishop raised the question of my marriage with Katherine and the fact that we had not been blessed with a surviving son and heir. He quoted Leviticus from the bible, "if a man should uncover the nakedness of thy brother's wife it is an unclean thing, it is a sin, they shall remain childless" even though we did have a daughter – I still did not have the son that I craved.

It was then that my conscience began to trouble me.

However, in 1520, a stupendous event that would rock the Roman Catholic Church took place that distracted me – Martin Luther's 95 Theses nailed to the doors of Wittenburg Cathedral. This man, a renegade priest, had sought to protest against certain corruptions taking place in the Church. And I, being a staunch Roman Catholic, wrote a book in answer to his diatribe called "The Asserton of the Seven Sacraments".

The Pope was so impressed with this work of theology, that he awarded me the title "Defender of the Faith", a title that has been borne of every monarch since that time and has been stamped on every minted coin of the realm in the form of the initials F.D., or Fidei Defensor" to this day. This made me very proud indeed.

In 1525 I met and fell passionately in love with Anne Boleyn and it was with and because of her that I caused the face of English and ultimately world history to change. I had been having an affair with her sister Mary who was expecting my second illegitimate child.

First saw Anne at a masked ball being held at Wolsey's wonderful home, Hampton Court. She had somewhat become pre-contracted to the Earl of Northumberland's son, Harry Percy, and I was approached to give my blessing and permission for them to marry. I refused, for I had my own hidden agenda, I wanted Anne for my mistress.

There then ensued a battle of wills between us – she would not become my mistress – I tried in vain to command her to do so. The more she withheld the more I fell in love with her. I was so smitten that I wrote poetry to her and composed the song "Greensleeves" in her honour. Of course this situation could not continue and she demanded that she would not share a bed with me unless we were married and she was Queen.

This then brings me to what has become known to history as "the King's Secret Matter".

I recalled the conversation between Wolsey and the Bishop of Tarbe and my conscience began troubling me again, only this time with more insistency.

I had a meeting with Wolsey and then told him what I intended to do – divorce Katherine and marry Anne. Wolsey was shocked and horrified – I looked at him and cried "I shall have my way – even if it means splitting the earth in two as an apple and casting it into the void" !!!!! – I then stormed out spluttering with rage and fury.

I commanded Wolsey to go to Rome to obtain a dispensation from the Pope. This was rejected as the Spanish Emperor Charles, Katherine's uncle, had invaded Italy and the Pope was virtually a prisoner in the high mountainous town of Orvieto.

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Acton Aid

The last weekend in June was a big one for Acton Aid. Following on from the success of last year's inaugural event, Mash in the Meadow took place on Friday 27th June. Returning acts Flash Harry and Lizzie Deane were joined by Slapface & the Hoagies and Trevor Moss & Hannah Lou. All the acts put on fantastic performances and it was incredible to see so many people dancing in the meadow as Lizzie Deane wound up the evening. After a quick spruce-up (and a few downpours) during the day on Saturday 28th June, the meadow was ready for Proms in the Meadow. This year Proms in the Meadow coincided with Armed Forces Day and commemorated the centenary of the start of the First World War. Veterans and serving members of the armed forces within Iron Acton were honoured during a programme led by the Bristol Millennium Orchestra with performances from soloist Juliet Curnow, Caroline Huish, the Kathryn Hurley Dance Academy, Bristol Pipes & Drums, Iron Acton Community Choir and the U3A Ukulele Group.

After weeks of dry weather the forecast for Mash and Proms weekend was poor but, incredibly, the weather stayed dry for both evenings (which made up for several soakings throughout the day on Friday and Saturday!) The events are a huge undertaking for Acton Aid. Aside from months of planning, the physical effort takes place over four days. We have already turned our thoughts to Mash and Proms 2015!

Following on swiftly from Mash and Proms, the annual Acton Aid Cultural Trip took place on the first weekend in July. Fort William was the destination this year with the objective of climbing Ben Nevis - the highest mountain in the British Isles at 1,344m above sea level. A party of 15 (with 55 years between the youngest and oldest - names have been withheld to protect the innocent!) set off from the foot of the mountain after a highland breakfast. Again, we were incredibly lucky with the weather, walking mainly in bright sunshine. The quicker walkers in the party made the summit in about three hours with those walking at a more measured pace following within a couple of hours. All 15 posed together for a photo on the summit cairn before heading back down to the hospitality that awaited us at the Ben Nevis Inn!

Since the last edition of Focal Poyntz, in addition to Mash and Proms and the Cultural Trip, Acton Aid has participated in the Big Spring Clean organised by Iron Acton Parish Council, held the second Acton Aid Karting Grand Prix (won by Tony Harris) and run the barbeque at May Day. Also since the last edition, Acton Aid has welcomed James Anthony, Mike Ford and Andrew Williamson as new members.

Looking ahead, Acton Aid's next event is the Iron Acton Beer Festival on Saturday 6th September, 4:00pm to 9:30pm in the Parish Hall garden. This time we will be celebrating the fantastic beers available locally. There will be a selection of the finest brews made within a 10 mile radius of the village as well as refreshing cider and great wines. Tickets are £7 per adult if bought by 31st August and £9 per adult afterwards. This includes a special edition Beer Festival glass and first drink. Tickets for accompanied children under 18 are 50p each which include a soft drink.

Acton Aid meetings take place at The Lamb Inn at 8:00pm on the first Thursday of each month. Meetings have the minimum of formality. Fundraising events and the distribution of resources are discussed and planned over a pint or two.

Volunteering in Ghana

What does your grandmother do when she doesn't want you home for the whole summer? Sends you to Africa of course! This is exactly what happened to me for 3 weeks.

I went to volunteer in a school for underprivileged and orphaned children. This involved teaching the children one to one, either Mathematics or English. Some of the children were incredibly bright and had a very good knowledge and understanding while others didn't understand basic English or Maths, which was very sad. There were children at the school who were all at different abilities but their education level was not dependent on age as some of the older children were at the level of a 6 year old.

I was teaching one girl in particular called Alice. She was an incredibly bright child and could easily count to 100, easily added number up to 20, easily recognise animals and could pick out any letter of the alphabet and name a word beginning with that letter without a problem. It was sad when I had to go though, as I saw her progress when we started to learn subtraction which once she got she was amazingly happy with and her whole face lit up. During the afternoons I would go teach lessons to children at the School Of Excellence. This involved planning lessons for the children and then making sure it suited their abilities and it was clear and easy for them to understand. This was very enjoyable and these children were also from very poor backgrounds but it was nice to see how excited they were to learn and that they actually wanted homework!

When I wasn't teaching at the School Of Excellence I was either visiting the pool and trying not to come home white, or exploring Ghana or experiencing the craft market! The craft market was a very interesting experience. As I was walking around the craft market people would grab my arm and pull me into their store to make me buy things and see what they had. Once I got use to this I was able to say no, but before this point it was very hard to do so. Another big part of Ghanaian culture is to haggle the price of something you are about to buy. I found this very enjoyable and always managed to get it to the price I wished!

Overall I had the most amazing experience in Ghana and I would recommend that if anyone ever gets the chance to go then to do it as it will change you as a person for the better and the things you experience will stay with you forever and the friends you make will be for life.

I've been invited for holidays to all parts of the world and of course, I have invited all my new friends to visit Iron Acton!

N.B To all grandparents, save up and send your grandchildren to volunteer in Ghana it will be money well spent.

Web Site

I would point out that the only officially legal documents are those held by the Clerk. The web site is updated as frequently as is practically possible.

Allotments

Both allotment sites in the Parish continue to flourish despite a very wet start to the season. Waiting lists for allotments are at an all time low and so if you are keen to join the increasing band of allotment gardeners, please contact Donna Beal, the Parish Clerk.

The following is from the Chairman, Peter Bellis and not the opinion of the Parish Council.

Communication

One of the things that often comes up, is how can we communicate best with the parishioners? We are immensely appreciative of Focal Poyntz because of it's reach to every household in the Parish. We also try to make good use of our Parish Council website, although from time to time we are held up by technical problems (we are not alone in this, S Glos have had similar problems recently). If there is a really burning issue we can think about flyers to every household, but this is expensive and time consuming- we can't do this very often. However we will do it where we think it's necessary, for example on the sites & places planning consultation. Don't forget you can always come to the meetings! Apart from that, please do speak to any of your Parish Councillors - we appreciate the people who take the trouble to do that.

South Gloucestershire Sites & Places Planning

Planning procedures and laws are a constantly changing situation. Broadly speaking, if S Glos don't have workable planning policies in place, against which planning applications can be considered, then developers may be in the position to bypass all local consideration and seek a decision direct from the Secretary of State. So we have tried to make sure that we give a credible input on behalf of the Parish when S Glos are drawing up their policies. Recently we helped S Glos to hold a drop-in consultation meeting. This was well attended by parishioners and S Glos were impressed by the thought that Iron Acton were giving this matter.

Traffic in High St, Holly Hill, Nibley Lane

Most people are probably aware that due to the building of a replacement bridge, Church Road in Frampton Cotterell will be shut for at least 6 weeks over the summer holiday. This will have a severe impact on traffic using the above roads in Iron Acton. I, together with other Parish Councillors, have met S Glos Councillors and Officers, as well as representatives from other affected parishes. The aim of this was to ensure that all reasonable and legal options were being considered to deal with the problem. Well the short answer is, yes they are, but actually there's not much more can be done to make things better than last time. Extra & earlier signs have gone up to help people think about how to plan their journeys, and the traffic light phasing on the bypass. This will mean that it might take longer to get out of the village so it's not always a good answer but overall in this situation it should help. The traffic engineers suggest that vehicles parked in the street (providing they do not actually cause an obstruction) help to keep speeds down.

Location of Parish Council Meetings

We currently meet in 3 locations - North Road School, the Marshall Rooms and the Parish Hall. There are advantages and disadvantages to moving the meetings

around. With planning, it is becoming important for us to be able to make use of the S Glos planning website during our meetings and to project images onto a screen or suitable wall. This points towards one location being better, together with advantages of other document storage if we settle on one location. On the other hand, there are considerations of how easy is it for people to get to meetings, with a significant proportion of the parishioners being part of an individual community in and around North Road. The Parish Councillors can form an opinion about what is best, but how much does it matter to you and what do you think about it? Please let us know.

Grass Cutting On Verges

You will have started to see the effect of what we have mentioned earlier in the year - because of budget pressures, S Glos are not cutting grass on verges to the same frequency. Our options as a Parish were to settle for this, or to pay to have extra cuts, either by S Glos or by a suitable contractor arranged by us. So far we have taken the route of saving your money. However, would you like to see some extra grass cutting, particularly in areas where the Parish is particularly on view? Once again, we need to know what you think so please let us know.

Iron Acton Women's Institute

We've had a few animal themed talks this year, starting with the speaker from Avon Riding Centre and continuing in March with Pam Weaver, who spoke about training animals for films. Pam found herself providing animals for film and TV by accident over twenty years ago. She was at a show with her Dexter cattle when she was spotted by film makers of Robin Hood, Prince of Thieves, starring Kevin Costner, who wanted cows with horns in the film. She so enjoyed the experience on the film set that she was happy to continue providing animals and appearing herself as an extra in many films and TV series since, including Lark Rise to Candleford and Tess of the d'Urbervilles. She provides a range of farmyard animals including chickens, ducks, geese, goats, pigs and cows. It was a fascinating insight into a world most of us never get to see or experience.

This was followed in April by Verna Clifford, who is registered blind, speaking about not only her guide dog, Cody, but the various gadgets that make her daily life much easier. As well as a speaking clock and a "talking calendar", she has a digital recorder to enable her to remember the various washing machine programmes, a talking filofax which, after speaking the name of the contact, will dial up automatically and talking timers and calculators. She spoke of the kitchen aids that are available for measuring liquids and weighing ingredients and of the speaking books available from libraries on disk, free to the blind. Most of us were also unaware that books of stamps come with notches on to be able to differentiate between first and second class stamps. She then spoke of Cody, a Labrador cross, and the immense difference he makes to her life. He sounds a real character who is not adverse to stealing food and eating socks and chamois leathers if given the chance! Each guide dog costs approximately £50,000 to train, its upkeep and so on. So that absolutely everyone who is entitled to, and would like a guide dog, is not penalised by being unable to afford the upkeep, food, vets fees etc, they cost only a nominal 50 pence to the owner and all expenses are then covered by the Guide Dog charity. We learnt a lot more about this worthwhile charity and the daily obstacles faced by the blind from Verna and were happy to make a donation on her behalf.

For something completely different we welcomed Ross from SITA UK to talk about the recycling in South Gloucestershire. Poor Ross had to take some of the angst felt by members regarding the recent charging of £36 to have garden waste taken away but he answered all the criticism in a professional and good natured way. He also explained about where the food waste is sent for recycling (Oxford) and electronics to Newport in Wales. He said that because of the high cost of some of the super duper recycling machines that are available in some areas, it is still cost effective to recycle as much as possible, even if it can't all be done locally. Some of us had never received some of the recycling bags or boxes available for cardboard and newspapers etc so we were able to leave our names and addresses and these were duly delivered to us the following week.

The June outing was to Dewstow Gardens and Grottoes in Caerwent, South Wales. It was fortunately a fine evening and a group of members and their families enjoyed first some tea and cake and a brief film explaining the gardens before exploring for themselves. The gardens date back to 1893 when the estate was purchased by Henry Oakley, remaining in his possession until his death in 1940. A unique garden with subterranean grottoes was created but, having no descendents, the gardens were filled in and reverted to pastureland. As there were no records, the buried gardens were forgotten until 2000 when the Harris family bought the land and

evidence began to emerge of the amazing gardens. The trip was very much enjoyed and would be recommended to anyone who is interested in more unusual gardens.

May Day was once again hugely successful, aided by another year of good weather. The village green and surrounding area remained busy all day. Our bric-a-brac stall was once again full of interesting and varied artefacts and as usual anything that was left over was taken away and three charity shops benefited. One item that never made the stall was a hostess trolley, being donated by Rona. Someone from Paul's Place, a charity we had previously invited to speak at a meeting, enquired about the cost as at present they had to rely on one of their volunteers taking in theirs. Rona gladly donated the trolley on behalf of the WI and the representative from Paul's Place was immensely grateful for the gesture.

As a change from our usually July walk, we are gathering at Jacksons for a skittles evening. As well as hopefully being a fun evening, there will be some serious training for this year's inter-WI skittles competition, which so far has only ever seen us through to round 2 and that only because we had a bye on that occasion!

So please put thinking caps on and no matter how wild and whacky please let us know and we will investigate what is viable.



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


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
