"FOCUS ON IRON ACTON" - from an idea generated in Charles Wilkins' Dog House over a bottle of his best German Wine. Charles and Godfrey Cook (regular but poor golf players) were at that time somewhat depressed by the news that Golf had been declared unfit for respectable people - the courses being frequented by socially unacceptable people who made wealth through undesirable means.

It was only some weeks later that they discovered that this news had been issued by the inner council of ayatollahs and only applied to Iran. But now the seed had germinated, fostered and nurtured by the fact that everyone consulted thought it was an excellent idea - probably on the basis that it would shut the two of them up - verbally anyway!

At this juncture, Wilkins, having listened to Cook's ideas on the subject (obviously affected by the quality of wine being drunk at the time) thought it wise to enlist the help of a few intelligent people so that he, at least, would have some compatible company at meetings. Joy Waker, Sue Pullen and Joanna Voss were asked to assist (Pip turned up instead but this situation was accepted - he can at least make sure that tolerably decent English will be used.

All had been dismayed for some time by the lack of communication within the Parish. There were an appreciable number of Clubs and other organisations all doing a splendid job but in many cases their activities known only to a small section of the Parish. Something was needed - a publication for circulation - thus

- (1) To be distributed free to all householders in the Parish. (it was thought that no-one could be persuaded to pay real money for a copy)
- (2) To be issued initially every three months not too ambitious to begin with but hopefully the issues will become more frequent.
- (3) The aims:-
 - to stimulate peoples interest in their own Parish by keeping them informed of all activities that have recently taken place, are now taking place or are proposed to take place in the near future;
 - (ii) to assist existing organisations expand their membership by interesting others in their activities;
 - (iii) to encourage the formation of other Clubs, sporting and other activities, competitions etc., by bringing together people with the same interests;

- (iv) to interest readers in the history of not only the village but the personalities who have lived there in the past and also those who still live there;
- (v) to publish articles, poems etc., by local people on any subject (apart from politics) which would be of general interest;
- (vi) to encourage young and middle-aged potential journalists to accept responsibility for the future publication.

We shall probably be responsible for a lot of mistakes as we have no previous experience of this kind of venture - if so please laugh - don't moan - after all it hasn't cost you anything. We would sooner have your printable contributions, we certainly need your help.

The first edition is composed in the main of details of the organisations within the Parish - with help, future editions will contain plenty of readers' contributions.

Finally, our thanks to Maureen Chapman for designing the front cover.

IRON ACTON SCHOOL - Plans are going ahead for a facelift for Iron Acton School in 1983, when it is hoped to restructure and modernise the building.

The school caters for children of Primary School age (4 - 11 years) from the village and surrounding areas.

Since its opening as Iron Acton National School in 1874, very few structural alterations have been made. A new toilet unit was erected in 1965, and a Terrapin classroom was added in 1966.

Present plans are that the existing staffroom will, with an extension, become the Infant's classroom, and a second floor is to be installed in the present Infant's room which will accommodate the Junior class. The remainder of the present building will provide the school with a hall which will be used for physical education, drama, resource areas etc., as well as a new servery and dining area. A new staffroom, office, children's and staff toilets are being added at the rear of the school. The Terrapin classroom will then be removed.

This restructuring is likely to cost well in excess of £100,000, and it is hoped that work will start in the Spring.

IRON ACTON WOMEN'S INSTITUTE - The aim of the Women's Institute is to promote women's interests and their motto is "For Home and Country".

Iron Acton W.I. was formed in November 1919 at a meeting in the Schoolroom, followed by meetings at Algars Manor, then at The Institute, (The Old Village Hall), and finally to the New Village Hall in 1954. This information came from old minute books still in possession of the W.I. Reading through these old records is very fascinating and perhaps in future editions of this paper we may be able to publish copies of the minutes.

Iron Acton W.I. belongs to the Sodbury Vale Group in the Avon Federation, who inturn belong to the National Federation of Women's Institutes in London. The N.F.W.I. is affiliated to the Associated Country Women of the World.

The last most interesting event was The Diamond Jubilee in 1979, but the W.I. is permanently involved in Group, Country and National activities, sending a delegate twice a year to County meetings and one every two years (alternating with Yate) to the National Federation Annual General Meeting at the Albert Hall in London.

Courses and meetings in the January Avon Federation News Letter include Cookery, Georgian England, Conservation and Drama, and an Art and Photography Exhibition - not quite the Jam and Jerusalem image, most people have of the W.I.

THE VILLAGE HALL AND THE FUTURE - As 1982 draws to a close, it is good to be able to report that this year the Hall has been more fully used than ever before, and that bookings for 1983 indicate a busy future ahead. Believing, as I think we all do, that the Hall is a focus for the community spirit of the village, this tells the story of a flourishing village life.

Of course, we all know about the Hall's shortcomings, its somewhat chilly and spartan atmoshpere when we open it up on a winter's eve, its jumbled store room, its inhospitable toilets and its cramped kitchen and stage. Three years ago a great deal of money was spent on improving the washroom facilities but, stupid vandals from whom we are never wholly free have left their mark.

The situation with regard to the kitchen, storeroom and stage is more hopeful. Just over a year ago the committee considered a scheme to build a storage facility (scene-dock etc.) on the North gable end of the Hall, and to add a Northward extension of the ammittee room so as to improve the green-room facilities for stage shows. Such an extension would free the present storeroom which could then be connected to the kitchen by a doorway and used, either as a sarvery and bar or as a small meeting room. We visualised that smaller groups might wish to hire just the committee room, kitchen and intervening room, thus saving expense for themselves and reducing the Hall Committee's heating costs.

On big occasions, such as the Village Hall Variety Show or the Annual Auction, the room can be used as a bar and thus overcome the shortage of working space in the kitchen. Furthermore, the Committee has been asked if the Hall could be used, from time to time, for stage drama festivals. If the new accommodation can be built, then we shall have a back-stage facility good enough to offer the Hall for such festivals. Additionally, we shall give encouragement to our own resident drama group, The Actonians, who have built up such an excellent reputation locally and throughout Avon for vigour, skill and enthusiasm in their productions

Funds for such a project are bound to be a problem, but the Committee are confident that we shall be able to raise the money and that the Village will be behind us in our efforts. The plan is that the Avon Community Project who are currently preparing drawings for the planning authorities will provide the professional services and labour (supported by the Manpower Services Commission) while we find the money for materials. Even the latter may cost well over £5,000 but, thanks to our savings, a generous promised grant from the Parish Council and another one from Northavon D.C., we are optimistic, and feel sure that, whatever the shortfall, the Village will help us to raise the "necessary". Delays, due to re-organisation within the Community Building Project, have been frustrating, but we are now fairly certain that building will start early in the Summer.

In conclusion I would like to thank all those members of the Committee and other volunteers who help keep the Hall going, trimming hedges, painting walls, repairing breakages, all in their own precious time. Our fund raising events such as the Variety Show and Auction and the Horticultural Show require an enormous effort from every member of the Committee and I can honestly say that there isn't a "passenger" among them.

THE STORY OF ACTON AID - ACTON AID was formed in early 1973 by means of a letter from Brian Burgess to a number of men in the Parish inviting them to a meeting to consider ways and means of getting together as a body which could provide a service to the village. As a result ACTON AID came into being as an organisation of men resident in the Parish with the purpose of "Assisting the Parish and its People".

Today, ten years later, it has become a "Registered Charity" with a membership of nearly fifty; and must have raised in that time approximately £10,000 by means of Barn Dances, Horse Shows, Draws, etc.

There are many ways in which this money has been spent besides donations to the Church, Guides and Brownies, the School, Youth Club and Village Hall. Christmas parcels have been provided for pensioners, and summer outings or theatre parties for the elderly, as well as parties for the children and holidays for the handicapped. Jubilee mugs were distributed to youngsters throughout the Parish in 1977 and Wedding Day crown pieces in 1980. And so the list goes on!

ACTON AID has also offered its services where required in such things as painting the Village Hall, rebuilding stone walls there and at the Church, assisting in the development of the Parish Fields, providing transport for hospital visiting, and a notice board for the use of all societies in Iron Acton. Members are always willing to assist physically with other events needing help.

ACTON AID meets, and new members are welcome, on the first Thursday in each month at the Rose and Crown at 8:00 p.m. Its social activities for members and friends offer an excellent opportunity for new residents to "get-together".

The Annual General Meeting will be, as usual, on the first Thursday in February and the Tenth Anniversary Dinner Dance will be held at "Rockwood" Yate Rocks, on Friday 25th February. Tickets for members and friends are available at £9:50 each from Mr. Gerry Millward, "Comerways", High Street.

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IRON ACTON YOUTH CLUB - Iron Acton Youth Club is open to any children of the Parish who are 12 years and over. The annual membership fee is 50p and the weekly entrance fee 25p.

On the last trip to Bristol we were able to see the much acclaimed filmE.T. It is hopes that in the summer months we shall utilise the Parish Meadows for games, such as rounders and football.

ACTONI ANS DRAMA GROUP - The Actonians were formed fifteen years ago and now have a membership of about forty adults. Our current Chairman is Steve Birch (Winterboume 772718), Secretary Jane Endicott (Bristol 793598) Treasurer Robert Sanday.

We put on two full length plays each year in the autumn and spring, each for three nights in the Village Hall.

We also do a one-act play in February and March for the Festivals and the Evening of Entertainment. Apart from these three main plays we put on various melodramas, sketches and mummers plays. We also run several fund raising events each year as well as dinners, parties etc.

The Annual General Meeting is held in the first half of June to choose the new committee, which consists of eight officers and five other members, and meets each month in various members homes.

A general meeting is held to choose and cast the play, and rehearsals take place twice a week, at first in the Rose and Crown, and then, as the production date draws nearer, in the Village Hall. After the play we have another general meeting to hear the report on it.

For the Festivals this year we are putting on five scenes from three of Shakespeares plays, and the spring production will be "The Night of the Iguana".

Annual Subscriptions are £5 for full membership and £2.50 for Associate Members - the latter do not act, but receive newsletters and tickets for the productions, and can attend all other events.

The Chairman's son, Geoff, a former player, is very active in the Treasurer's post and the playing affairs are the responsibility of Bob Ford, again a former player.

Many people have been involved with the legendary Football Club over the years for which a special place is reserved in their hearts. Every Boxing Day a match takes place between the present side and old faces from the past.

The event is always well patronised and figures high in the calendar of club events. The most recent of these games took place on Boxing Day last year and if the number of people in the Ross and Crown Bar was anything to go by, patronage broke all records.

THE PARISH COUNCIL - Originally Parish Councils were elected for one year at the Annual Parish Meeting, and votes were cast by a show of hands. Nomination papers were handed in at the Parish Meeting, then the names were called in alphabetical order and the parishioners present voted.

The nine with the highest number of votes were elected, and if two people tied for ninth place the Chairman gave his casting vote.

The last annual election was held in March 1899, and from March 1901 elections were for a term of three years.

The Local Government Act of 1933 allowed Parish Councils to apply to the County Council for future elections to be by ballot, and in October 1936 the Parish Council resolved to do this.

The first election by ballot was in Apri! 1937 and continued to take place every three years until 1979 when the present councillors were elected. The term of office was then changed to four years so that the next local elections are due in May this year. The Annual Parish Meeting will be in April when it is hoped that parishioners will come along and air their views.

The Parish Council administers the cemetery, allotments, village greens and recreation fields.

Thanks to the generosity of Miss Isemonger, a previous resident of the village, the parish now owns Chillwood and the allotments at Station Road.

The Parish Fields were purchased in 1978, since when planning permission has been granted for change of use to sports and recreational purposes.

The present Chairman is Betty Cook, Neksdore, High Street and the Clerk is Norman Carter, 9 Chilwood Close.

Playground equipment has been delivered and will be installed as soon as weather permits. Unfortunately the continual wet weather has delayed this. But at least it has been good for the planting of trees and shrubs on the boundaries of the Parish Field, which was carried out in November.

TENNIS - So many people in the village have recently shown interest in playing tennis, that Mrs. Eileen Hughes has decided to call a meeting at Hill House, on February 10th at 7:30 p.m. to discuss the possibility of forming a local club.
