



Frogs and toads get the most awful press. Many people think of them as being slimey creatures which can give them warts or worse. The truth of the matter is rather different; frogs and toads are totally harmless and are great friends of the gardener, eating many of the pests which can infest the vegetable patch.

However, in recent years frogs and toads have been suffering because many of their wild ponds have been filled in to make way for new houses or farmland. To make up for this, some gardeners have been building wildlife ponds in their own back yards to provide a safe haven for these increasingly uncommon creatures.

From St. Valentine's Day, Avon Wildlife Trust will be encouraging more people to make a place for frogs and toads in their lives with its CROAKLINE. By ringing Bristol 268018 frog-lovers will be offered the chance to receive a free CROAKPACK full of useful tips on caring for frogs and toads in the garden and the latest advise on the best kind of pond to build for them.

People with ponds that are overflowing with spawn can ring in to join our spawn bank, so that others can have the chance to introduce frogs to their ponds. And those wanting to give a frog a home should ring in to see if someone near them can offer them the spawn they need to have a pond brimming with tadpoles by the summer.

So whatever you want to know about frogs and toads, it looks like the CROAKLINE on Bristol 268018 is the answer to all your questions.

On Good Friday at 7.00 p.m. we welcome the annual visit of the Whites Hill Male Voice Choir. The address will be given by Mr. Phillip Green from Kingswood, Bristol.

On Sunday 9th April we will welcome Members of the Bristol Evangelical Male Voice Choir who will arrange and conduct the whole service. This service will commence at 6.30 p.m. instead of our usual starting time of 6.00 p.m. There will be further special services during the year.

If anyone has any old photographs or records relating to the Church the Pastor would be delighted to see them and if possible take copies to enable us to build up our records. Please telephone him on Rangeworthy 587.

The records in our possession would appear to suggest that the Church started in or about 1870 with Cottage Prayer Meetings. These were followed by the erection of a Galvanized Iron Chapel which itself was replaced in 1909 by the present Building.

Services are held every Sunday with the Bible Class Meeting at 2.30 p.m. and the Gospel Services held at 6.00 p.m.

The Ladies meet for their Services on alternate Tuesdays at 2.30 p.m.

- 3rd.Sept. .. down to Acton.. cycled to Gordano with M. Rowlands, A. Davis, E. Morgan... got a little muddled and arrived just before half-time Iron Acton 2 Gordano Utd. 3. A chap named Holmes from Bristol let Acton down by not turning up. C. Lane played in long trousers and with a bad hand. B. Taylor and S. Dyer scored. We had to stop for about an hour for M. Rowlands to have his cycle crank looked to at a cycle shop. We came across the Suspension Bridge twice.. E.M. and A.D. went on.. M.R. and I got back about 8.30 p.m.
- 4th. "
 .. to church... handed back magazine given to me by Miss N. Dust..
 rode down to Acton... stayed on the corner with Curtis and E.
 Morgan (he directing the traffic!). H. Wiggins and J. Ellis went
 nutting. .. evening service.. Mrs. Ellis played the organ.. Mr.
 Holcombe being ill.
- I saw a lame bull in the Avenue (King's bull) .. gang in Wallbank's porch.. Lloyd Prout there. 'Dingo' Dyer and 'Shirty' Seymour bought two 6½d. mouthorgans and were playing songs... we saw a charabanc go past with some chap dressed up as a conductor in it conducting a sing-song.
- 8th. " .. G. Aldom said that he had seen two fire engines and an ambulance go down the road.. this because we had heard some shouting coming from Acton... not true.
- 10th." football match. Iron Acton School 7 Tytherington School 5. .. I believe Mrs. Huggins has her hair bobbed. I took a cockerel from B. Howes' to Sansum's this morning for my uncle. .. down to Acton... had kick on the leg from 'Toffee' May. Iron Acton 4 St. Francis 2. S. Dyer, B. Taylor and B. Seymour scored.
- 11th." Miss Priscella Turner and Mr. Gowen (from Yate) were married at I. Acton yesterday.
- 14th." Eclipse of the moon tonight.. not visible.. cloudy.
- 15th."

 Mrs. Bodman said that Mrs. Jenkins had 'fits on the brain' and that she is sinking.

 ... football behind Pinnell's.. D. Day, J. Wyman, G. Kingscott, M. Pinnell, D. Emery and C. Organ 6. J.K. and S. Ponting, V. Crossey and myself 5. G. Kingscott hit Pinnell's cat flying off the wall with a hot drive.
- 16th. "
 .. up to Sodbury with G. Wiggins, E. Padfield and others to the Labour Ex. big crush outside... I had to wait until last to obtain my card.. a car coming out of Park St. ran into the 3.45 bus going to Wotton.. no-one injured.
- 17th."

 .. football.. Iron Acton 7 St. Leonard's Bible Class 2. They brought a whole charabanc load of girls and fellows (including their vicar).. plenty of noise and fun.. they had a little mascot. Iron Acton's team.. R. Bateman: A. May, E. Padfield: F. Broome, A. Harmer, J. Richardson: B. Taylor, R. Smith, F. Dyer, S. Dyer, B. Seymour. .. evening.. went to the Show behind the Crown.. good crowd there. Mrs Jenkins died this morning.

- 19th."

 .. up to the Labour Ex. Mr. Turner spoke to me about a job at the Electrical Works at Yate. .. listened to Ponting's gramophone playing "Around the Marble Arch".
- 20th."

 .. evening.. played football on the Green.. saved penalty from G. Wiggins. Alec England hit A. Sheppard on the jaw for having too much to say when Bob Sheppard kicked the ball over into Kent's. Mrs Jenkins funeral today.. Aeroplane flights start today at Alveston.. 5/-d. 10/- (loop the loop)
- 21st." .. went over to Kingswood with V. Cater, E. Padfield and M. Rowlands.. Kingswood 3 Keynsham 2. Replay of English Cup match.
- 24th."
 .. went to Bristol (Packer's Ground) to watch match. M.A.C. 1.
 Iron Acton 8. Alec and John Jenkins (related to the Jenkins family
 in Chaingate Lane) were playing for St. Pancras Re. on pitch
 alongside.
- 27th."

 .. to Labour Ex. with V. Cater... we called at Yate Market.. on the Nibley to tell Mr. Fletcher that a job had been found for Cecil.
- 29th." Five-a-side match.. Mudgedown 8 (M & T. Pinnell, K. Ponting & myself) Chaingate Lane 5 (B. Wilkins, J. Wyman, S & K. Nicholls).
- 30th." Paid Mr. Gowen the rent.. he gave me 2/- back.
- 1st.Oct. Football match.. Mudgedown 5 Jubilee Terrace 8.
- 2nd."

 Sum. Harvest Festival. Holy Communion at 8.0'clock with D. Gibbons. Served at 11 o'clock service with D. Clark.. walked to evening service with M. Pinnell and G. Kingscott.. church crowded out.
- 4th. " went for ride with V. Cater to Codrington and up to the Roman Camp.. we called in at Yate Market.
- 6th. " .. football meeting. Messrs Blanchard, Unsworth, Prior, Morse and Holmes elected to Committee.
- 14th."

 .. choir practice.. the rector came down to Wallbanks to order V. Cater and me up to choir.. afterwards D. Gibbons, J. Ellis and V.Cater went round to the Girl Guides Hut in the Rectory garden with a stink bomb.
- 15th." saw.. B. Dyer, C. Fletcher and R. Elson. they were talking of starting a junior football team at North Road. They asked me if I would play in goal.
- 18th."

 .. over to North Rd. to football meeting. the 1st team had resigned from the league. Agreed to start a junior team under the name of Codrington Arms Juniors. B. Dyer elected captain. C. Fletcher vice-captain.

 .. team selected to play the first match: A. Strange: G. Smith: B. Dyer: C. Pearce: L. Wookey: H. Hendy: B. Aldom: R. Elson: B. Milsom: C. Powell: C. Fletcher.

Spring is here, it's time to plant your potatoes, clean out your cupboards and to send all your unneeded and unwanted clothes to the Friends Jumble Sale. This year it will be held on April 8th in the School Hall, with jumble, white elephant, books and toy stalls, plus the delicious cake stall and other side shows such as the Grand National Draw to encourage you to part with your money. At the beginning of April our leaflets will be popping through your letter box asking for your unwanted jumble and telephone numbers to contact for collection. It's a great opportunity not to be missed, so remember the Friends when you are spring-cleaning and don't forget to come and support the school on April 8th.

The Jumble Sale is our first big fund-raiser of 1989. After the frantic fund raising of last summer and autumn we were delighted to be able to record a total income of over £2,000 at the A.G.M. in November. Needless to say the Friends had also spent over £2.000, and further items are still needed by the school. A coffee afternoon and the sale of studio Christmas cards helped to keep our funds topped up. Our latest buys have included a music centre for the Hall, a screen for the overhead projector, and a headphone multi-socket set for use with the tape recorder. This last item enables several children to listen to a tape at the same time.

Although it seems silly to talk about Summer Fayres in February, we have started to plan the Friends' already. Our summer fayre will be at the beginning of July, so make a note in your diary, in case you forget.

For anyone who has managed to escape the net of our leaflet circulation or who is new to the village and does not know who and what the Friends are, here is a brief description. The Friends of Iron Acton School was set up two years ago to raise money for the school and to provide a pool of helpers for school activities. Since then the Friends have raised over £3,000 and helped to provide such necessary items as a computer, a video, a piano, and books and have also helped in providing transport for school activities, cooking and cataloguing the library. We are always delighted to welcome new members and if you have any spare time and would like to offer your services then please contact Ron Dowding (340), or Jill Bradshaw (626).

How Village life has changed! I have been looking at some old Kellys Directories, the most recent one dated 1927. At that time Iron Acton had 2 coal merchants, 1 sawmill, 2 blacksmiths, 2 garages, 3 grocers, 4 other shopkeepers, 3 boot and shoe dealers or repairers, 2 bakers, 1 chimney sweep, 1 butcher, 1 saddler, 1 fried fish dealer, 2 Post Offices, 2 beer retailers, (as distinct from public houses) 1 cycle agent, a Police Station and a railway station. There was also a regular carrier service to Bristol.

Even when we came to live here in 1961 there were still 5 shops and the Post Office in the High Street. The only thing that has stayed the same is the number of pubs and Post Offices. Many of you will have enjoyed reading Mr. Strange's diaries and they must have brought back many memories. Surely there must be other people who have interesting stories to tell about the old days. Why not write them down so that we can share them with you?

If you think you could not write about it, contact us and one of us will come and chat to you, and write it for you. Everyone enjoys reading about the past, it would give pleasure to so many people.

The Acton Aid A.G.M. was held in February. There are now 44 members, but monthly meeting attendances continue to average about 13/14.

During the past year Acton Aid helped:-

- The children of Iron Acton .. by supporting Iron Acton School's Field Studies Week, by the children's party well attended this year and thanks to Tim Spare and Neale Bradshaw (plus their wives) who organised it by paying for the school children's tickets to James and the Giant Peach, the Actonians Christmas production.
- The old people of the village .. through the Christmas parcel distribution and summer coach trip.
- Also a donation to Guides and Brownies to cover the annual capitation fee.

Income for all of these good works came from ... Social events where Gerry Millward worked hard and ingeniously throughout the year, organising a Shipwreck Evening, and Oompah - German Evening in November wherein the band leader had various stalwart Iron Acton citizens performing various amazing Bavarian chants and arm movements!, while Gerry and Jenny toiled away behind a range of microwave ovens ... quite an evening! Thanks also to Barrie Wright who provided the venue for the summer(?) Barbecue, and to the different members who allowed Acton Aid the use of their homes for open evenings.

We owe a lot of the success for this year's Horse Show to Alan Powell and Maureen Chapman. To Alan, for the use of his splendid field as the venue, and to Maureen for co-ordinating the organisation of the event. A glorious September day rounded things off nicely - more thanks to Patrick Murphy and his band of helpers and Gerry Millward/John Percy's Manpower Services for providing the muscle power!

During the year we sounded out the possibility of starting a Neighbourhood Watch for the village following a couple of break-ins. However, nothing in this world is simple, there were unforeseen organisational problems not the least being that the police regarded Iron Acton as a low crime area (compared to other parts of the county)! I suppose that is reassuring!

We were grateful to receive donations from the Elizabethans (from a Whist Drive) and Bob Shepherd (North Road).

Mike Sutton created Acton Aid history (I think!) by becoming Chairman for the second time within two years when Derek Parry departed for pastures new in Axbridge. Not only Derek Parry left us .. Bob Booker, Rodney Harriman, Jack Morton all moved away and at the time of writing the sad news came that Ted Poole died in Frenchay Hospital. Ted's points of order, asides, monologues .. "Harumph .. Mr Chairman I must point out ..." will be sadly missed at future meetings ... which as usual will be held the first Thursday in each month at the Rose and Crown 8 p.m.

There is a deadline of 9.30 p.m. in operation, it would be nice to see an increase in the 'faithful 13' at these meetings! If you don't feel you want to come to the meeting, why not come along at 9.30 and have a drink with us.




GRAND PLANT SALE

This will almost certainly be on Saturday May 27th but watch out for posters nearer the






