ALFRED STRANGE'S DIARY

October 1933

9th.

2nd. I helped Mr Gould sort out tenders .. it was Council Board Day. Brown and Mr Wall came to the office to select the tenders. Cashed my salary cheque for September f1 18 8

Down to Norman Lane to check my uncle's cattle and then in to Gregg's College.

5th. Reg Elson called for me .. rode on the back of his bike to Gregg's College - a rough ride! Jack(Elson) doing something to his car .. we gave him a push.

6th. Rode M. Pinnell down to Norman Lane to check on beasts. Choir practice. Paid Morris of Tytherington 5s.6d.!! for repairs to my shoes.

7th.Sat. Away to Clevedon. Clev. St. Andrews 9 North Rd. 1 (Wilcox). The pitch was right at the top of a hill. We stayed at Clevedon until 7.30. Griff Smith not very well. Home in Elson's car 8.40.

8th.Sun.

To 8 a.m.service with D. Gibbons. Harvest Festival. Walked to the 11 a.m. communion service with M. Pinnell and F. Fortune. I served with H.White. Walked down to Acton in afternoon. In Wallbank's porch with J. Ellis, J. Lane and E. Morgan. Had a ring on the big bells for the evening service. Large congregation. Up to Yate with D. Gibbons and R. Elson .. we met Miss S off the train and walked back with her to Elson's.

Crash outside Buckingham Palace - car runs into crowd - two killed.

Into Greggs College on R.E's motor bike. When we returned found that Mr Elson had gone to meeting at the Institute on my bike .. I had to wait around .. Felt a bit of a fool!

10th. In lunch hour went with Mr Powell and H. Ovens to pick walnuts in the drive opposite office. I picked half my satchel full. Took basket for the Rector to King's (Two Pools Farm) and grapes for my grandmother from H. Festival.

Evening .. to football meeting at Codrington Arms. Dick Canvin began abusing Mr Elson. There was a fight after which Mr Elson resigned .. much commotion! Later home with D.C. and B. Aldom. (Dick Canvin lived with Mr Tom Alexander in Patch Elm Lane. He was killed in a motor cycle accident just before war broke out).

11th. Tea time .. Mr Colbourne had called to say my U. Cecil's beasts had got out of the field in Norman Lane. R. Ballam came with me on my bike .. it was alright .. Charlie Colbourne had put the cattle in another ground. Over to North road with D.G. Mr Alexander is now the new chairman of the football club.

Office .. I typed out summary of stone dug from Wick and Bury Hill Quarries.

Kingsford Smith beats Scott's record flight to Australia in 7 days 4 hours. In a Percival Gull plane made at Yate Aerodrome.

To Gregg's College .. R.E. bought a shirt and gloves in Castle St.

Yate North Road team to play Wick Ath. A. Strange, A. Greenaway, A. Mainstone, F.Dickson, M. Broom, C. Prentagast, - Evans - Matthews, A. Powell, D. Canvin, R. Wilcox.

13th. Typed out particulars of stone dug at Bury Hill Quarry for the past 10 years. Mr. Greenaway (Quarry owner) and Mr Search called at office. Evening .. down to Norman Lane again with M. Pinnell. We couldn't find the cows in the darkness .. went down to Colbourne's where we could see them over a wall. Bellringing practice .. a fellow (Mr Brown) from Winterbourne came. Later over to a social at North Rd. School with D. Gibbons .. L. Wookey sang a song.

14th.Sat. Football away to Wick. Called at Sodbury for Evans who couldn't play so returned to

North Rd. for R. Elson.

Wick Ath. 2 Yate North Rd. 3 (R. Elson, A. Powell and f. Dickson) Greenaway played

a good game.

Evening .. up to Yate with L. Wookey, C. Prentagast and J. Mackney. P.c. Young called in at

Haynes shop .. something to do with fireworks.

St. Leonard's B. Class 3 Iron Acton 4 - St. Silas 5 Rangeworthy 1.

16th. Germany leaves the League (of Nations).

17th. Another football meeting. Mr Elson now on the committee .. argument about car

expenses.

J. Cobb, D. Emery and L. Harvey join the church choir.

18th. Delivered Brit. Legion letter to Townsend at Jubilee Terrace. Across to the clubroom

at the Codrington Arms. Made a 139 break.

19th. To Greggs College on R.E's motor bike. I don't think I will go again on the back of

the m. bike .. too risky!

26th. Raymond owned by Sir Abe Bailey ridden by Nichol won the Cambridgeshire 40 to 1.

My uncle's cows now in a field belonging to Mr Roberts of Sheephouse Lane,

Latteridge.

28th. Took 32 lbs. of onions round to Miss Ozeland's shop in Chaingate Lane. Paid 2s.6d.

Football at Bedminster Down. T.S. Hall & Co. 8 Yate North Rd. 2 (R. Elson A. Greenaway) Foot and mouth disease broke out as we were playing .. notices up. We had to wash our shoes .. Concern to J. Elson and H. Washbourne who both had dairy

cows.

Mr C. Alsopp's funeral today.

29th. Typed 40 letters for Mr Gould (Yate churchwarden) re induction of new Rector at Yate

on 9th Nov. My salary cheque now £2.17.6d.


NORTH ROAD BAPTIST CHAPEL

BRYAN'S BIT I

To understand Australia is to first of all realise that, like Africa or America, it is not a country but a continent, just like Europe, but, like America, with no real history or culture; everything is either second hand or imported, so if my bit is shallow it is because that is all there was to find in the tiny bit that I was able to see of Australia, in fact, Western Australia and the City of Perth.

Entry into Australia through Perth Airport (about the same size as Lulsgate) is not easy. It's the usual rugby game for the luggage, 2 cases arrive quite quickly and then what seems a 2 hour wait for the last one, but then to immigration — officiados imported from Mother Russia before the collapse.

Seated on a high seat behind a screen, what might have been female in a past life, looked through at me as I waited behind a white line, before being given the Royal nod to approach 'her' bench.



Checking my immigration declaration form for lies she cross-examined me about the intended visit to 'her' country. 'Was there any insanity in my familu? "Yes," I replied, 'My Sister lives here." I was made to wait in a corner whilst this was digested, and then I was called for a further chat, having watched the complete complement of another flight pass through without problem. Returning to the bench I was asked "Do you have, or have you ever had a criminal record?" Hedging my bets, I said "Do I still need one to get into Australia?" That must have earned me the further 20 minute wait.

At last we were through and out to arrivals, and there was my niece waving to me, only she now looked 20 stones. As it turned out she wasn't my niece but some fat bird waving to someone behind me - the brain was much softened after 22 hours flying and a litre of duty free. Sister and Brother in Law were there to greet us and it was great trying to catch up on everything, their kids, our kids and their grandchildren we were soon to meet, all this whilst I was pushing a piggin great trolley of luggage to their cars, waiting at the furthest point of the car park.

I was soon to learn that the Australian way to park a car is either as far away from an entrance door as possible, or anywhere that will get the car as hot as possible whilst awaiting your return.

You have never seen as many old banger cars in your life as I saw during my stay, old Cortinas, Avengers even Mk 1 Granadas, it was like a parade to a scrap yard. I decided there and then not to try selling new cars to this place.

I won't bore you with my family visit because, after all, that is my business and not yours; all I will say is that it was fabulous, and my Mother seeing her great grandchildren in the flesh for the first time and at Christmas, the magic time for little ones was well worth every effort.

25 years before I had been in Freemantle. Freemantle is the sea port to Perth as Bristol is the entrance to the sea for Bath. I hadn't enjoyed Freemantle on that visit about the same as people on a day out to Reading find that City to be naff.

First impression was that the tie shop would go broke in a month, but a vest shop or a string of them (get the pun) would do a bomb.

The surprise was how green everything was. Perth was coming out of its winter and it had been a record wet one, but it was so green, and all colours were so vivid that if a plant was yellow, it was a bright yellow, and if it was orange, it was such a pure colour. We spent the first few days just looking at the surroundings and admiring all that we saw.

No shortage of water: sprinklers hitting us on all sides as we walked through their beautiful parks and all with no vandalism. We soon learnt that the Aussie youngster is in fear of the police and the more mature person hates and distrusts them as bent. A policeman's lot in W.A., cannot be a happy one - even the police headquarters building is curved to confirm how bent the force is.

Built on the banks of a wide blue shallow S shaped river, Perth is beautiful - even Wimpey or Heron couldn't get it wrong - but that's all it is, about 7 or 8 Sky Scrapers most with a history of fraud during the recent Bond days.

I declined a visit to the oldest house on the river: it was 154 years old: I explained that the Nook in our village that we had moved from was about 381 years old and I didn't enjoy 'modern buildings!'

Funny place W.A. It is almost like a labour controlled City with excellent services, free inner city gleaming buses, gardeners busy all day in the parks, all local employees with a guarantee of work with a 3 months holiday after 55 years of age, and council buildings everywhere (instead of Council read State, for the same amount of people). The truth is they are skint and how long this carnival can continue for is anyone's guess.

You have all heard about the Barbi on the beach for Christmas day, while we all freeze and shiver. Well, it is true, but the reason for it being on the beach is because of the heat, about 100F; you cannot cook in the house as it causes too much heat. On our Christmas Day, my sister being a great traditionalist, it was all cooked out in the garden and then brought into the house for eating, and it was great, just the same as I hope you all enjoyed.

The funniest thing I saw, in a holiday town down the coast, was a Father Christmas in all the kit but wearing sandals, giving out sweets to all the kids with the sweat running off his nose while he did it, it didn't seem right somehow.

The Bush is frightening. Millions of miles of knarled dead wood and scrub on a gravel soil just waiting to catch light into an inferno, and people build holiday homes there, just to have a place in the Bush, with local towns that are right back to the thirties and roads that lead off to nowhere, a difficult place for me to understand, but as a guest I did try to be polite if only so that immigration would let me out.

Leaving Australia was no problem; leaving the family was not so easy; we had grown together over the weeks so it was a sudden "Bye" and a dash through departure before the tears fell.

PARISH COUNCIL

The dry stone walling course attracted quite a good number of people and we hope you all learned how to keep your garden walls in repair.

Avon County have turned down any idea of traffic calming measures in the High Street because:-

- a) Iron Acton has the best record of any village for accidents (or rather lack of them!)
- b) Any obstacles they introduced would spoil a conservation area.
- c) The street lighting would have to be increased to the same power as that on the bye-pass.
- d) It would cost too much.

But we shall carry on trying to get some improvements and extra signs in Nibley Lane and on the green. They have at least agreed to provide road markings and plainer warnings at the school.

More stiles are now in hand and all footpaths should soon be completely free of obstructions. Councillors will be walking them during the summer, but if you find any problems meanwhile please report them to the clerk.

It seems many people are using the tennis courts without paying. We feel 50p each per game is little enough and does provide a sum to cover repairs, so play fair and pay up to the clerk. Children of course, still play free.

There has been much mention in the press recently about pensions and Post Offices, but don't be persuaded into having your pensions paid into a bank. Support your local Post Office, USE IT OR LOSE IT!

TREE WARDEN SCHEME

Do you have a little time to spare? Are you interested in trees?

The District Council is looking for Tree Wardens in local areas in support of the Tree Wardens Scheme. With the proposed Community Forest this will be very important and interesting work. There will be an introductory training day at Woodhouse Park, Almondsbury, in October, and further training courses will be given.

Tree Wardens do not need to be experts, only enthusiasts who care for the environment. The course will cover such subjects as surveying woodland and non-woodland trees, summer and winter tree identification, tree planting and after care, woodland ecology and management, seed collection and setting up a tree nursery, and tree law.

A number of trees have been planted through the parish over the last few years, and it would be good to know that someone was watching over them.

So if you think this is for you <u>PLEASE</u> give your name to the clerk or contact any councillor, and you will earn the gratitude of the whole village and the posterity.

THE HIGHWAY CODE?

Visitors to Britain might appreciate a leaflet giving tips on how to adjust to British ways of interpreting the Highway Code before setting out in a hire car. Such as:-

- a. Never use the inside lane of a motorway if there is room in the middle or in the outside lane, otherwise there is a serious risk that someone might overtake you.
- b. When you want to turn right at traffic lights, wait until the green appears before signalling with your indicator. Some advanced practitioners consider it a sign of weakness to use indicators at all.
- d. Those yellow box criss-cross markings at junctions look pretty but are not intended to be taken seriously. The same goes for double yellow no-parking lines, which you can neutralise by switching on your hazard lights.
- e. When coming up to a round-about, it is considered bad form to filter in smoothly, especially when there is no other traffic in sight. - f. Don't overtake unless you can see a blind bend, hill or another car approaching. You need something to aim at.
- g. On frosty mornings, never scrape the ice off your windows before setting off, otherwise the neighbours may think your car lacks de-misters.
