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IRON ACTON BIRD TALES

Spring is on the way but there is still a possibility of cold spells and frost, making it uncomfortable for birds to find enough food to get them in prime breeding condition for the months ahead. With the above in mind keep your feeders topped up, in fact I keep mine topped up all year, the birds will soon let you know when there is an abundance of wild food available as the feeders will only gradually empty. In recent years many finch species have declined due to an infection, trichomonosis, caused by a parasite which causes lethargy, difficulty in breathing and eventual death and has affected Greenfinches and now Chaffinches. To help stop the spread you should regularly clear all debris from bird tables and disinfect the surfaces. Also keeping feeders clean, I usually rotate my feeders every couple of weeks. Take the old one down replace with new one and disinfect and dry off the replaced feeder ready to exchange later. The disease is usually transmitted through the droppings so keeping surfaces clean is essential.

During the cold weather and snow in December I cut in half apples and put them on the ground around the feeders along with raisins, various seeds and crushed bird peanuts, actually I blitz them in a blender for 30 seconds until the bits are 2-3mm. At any one time I had over 10 Blackbirds squabbling over the food as well as a couple of Redwings, the odd Song Thrush along with Robins and Hedge Sparrows. I also made sure I emptied the frozen water trays every day and filled with fresh water for drinking and bathing, which although below zero birds still like to keep their plumage in tip top condition.

During this time I also had a Nuthatch taking sunflower hearts from the feeder and then flying to my cherry tree and hiding the seeds in any crevice or behind the bark for future use. They are lovely bluey grey on their backs and shoulders and white with rust colour breasts slightly smaller than a House Sparrow and is the only British bird that can walk head first down a branch or trunk.

Now is a good time of year to freshen up your bird boxes, empty any of last year's nesting materials – feathers, moss and the like and if you have some pesticide powder or spray put a little in the bottom of the nest box to kill off any little pests or fleas that may have survived the winter.

If you don't have any nest boxes then now is the time to either build some or buy one. There are any number of web sites showing how to build one and where to site it, you don't have to be an expert joiner as birds don't care what the box looks like as long as it is weather proof and in the right place. Robins like half open fronted boxes, while tits and even Wrens will nest in a box with a 25mm hole in the front or side. Just remember to put the box out of reach of cats and out of direct sunlight approx. 2-3 metres above ground level. As spring continues and you want to tidy your climbers and hedges remember to check for early nesting Robins, Blackbirds and the like – you don't want them to desert their nests.

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

The first bird he introduced to us was a Harris Hawk, native to America, and although it appeared large to us, it was a male and therefore smaller than the female. Tony had him fly to a nearby perch and return to him for morsels of meat. Although fully controlled at all times, some ladies rather regretted sitting in the front row! A very sweet bird Tony introduced us to was a five month old Tawny Owl, who sat very quietly and didn't seem at all fazed by his audience. Other birds we viewed were a Kestrel and a Peregrine Falcon but by far the largest, which drew a few gasps, was a European Eagle Owl. It was amazing to see such a beautiful bird at close quarters. We learnt a lot from Tony about the history of keeping birds of prey and historically who was allowed to fly such birds. It was a terrific start to 2023 and the varied programme we can look forward to this year.

We are pleased that we are in a position to sponsor a handbell for the Iron Acton handbell ringers in memory of our late Queen Elizabeth. There will be an inscription to include EIIR, a crown and the WI logo. 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



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FRIENDS OF NORTH ROAD SCHOOL

NIBLEY LANE

After a number of worrying road traffic accidents along Nibley Lane residents of Nibley approached Iron Acton Parish Council to raise their concerns about the significant risks to residents, walkers, cyclists, horse riders and drivers. There have been ongoing discussions between the parish council and South Gloucestershire Council about potentially closing Nibley Lane to motor vehicles in the vicinity of Robin Hood Overbridge. Officers at South Gloucestershire Council have asked the parish council to provide evidence of the views of residents, in Iron Acton and neighbouring parishes, for and against such a closure. 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IRON ACTON'S AUTObiography – VEHICLES THAT HAVE SHAPED OUR LIVES



We are building a virtual fleet of vehicles that mean something special to people in the parish. So far we have a 1974 Lancia Beta, a Ford Transit, a VW Transporter, a 1976 Mini 850 and a 2006 MINI Cooper. In the last edition we asked for your ideas on what to include next. We received an avalanche of great suggestions which ranged from a 1977 Morris Marina through a 2007 Nissan Note to a bang up-to-date Ford Mustang Mach E. Again though there was one model which shone through – a blue collar performance machine which captured the imagination of anyone with the slightest interest in cars in the eighties and has continued to do so – the Ford Escort XR3. For many, it was the subject of youthful longing and a tantalisingly accessible slice of exotic motoring. I well remember the day in 1982 when our chemistry teacher turned up in a new, 'Y' reg, silver XR3 and the growing aura of respect which he seemed to acquire as a result.

Firstly, a brief history of the Ford Escort. It was introduced to replace the Anglia in 1967 as a mid-size family saloon. It was very popular and seven years later it was updated with the Mark 2 being launched in 1974. Both were fairly traditional cars – Ford found that simple mechanics clothed in stylish metal were a profitable recipe. By 1980, though, people were looking for the new and modern and the Mark 3, which was introduced that year, reflected this mood perfectly. It was a fresh design and offered novelty in the form of front wheel drive, a new overhead cam engine and a hatchback. Most importantly though, the Mark 3 brought an exciting sporty version, tweaked to produce 96 bhp and stake Ford's claim in the growing hot hatch market. Fast versions of the Escort had been around before, notably the Mark 1 and 2, RS2000 and Mexicos, but they were never available in large numbers, or at such reasonable prices as the XR3 – the new car's list price was £5,750. And it had a big rear spoiler and slinky alloy wheels. It was launched to an excited motoring press who were able to drive a fleet of them on a newly built but not yet opened stretch of the M4 near Bridgend.

The XR3 undoubtedly caused a stir. It appealed to driving enthusiasts as well as those who were enticed by its winning combination of looks and practicality. It was certainly a good car but in some people's eyes, not yet great. In particular, the rival VW Golf GTi remained faster and smoother so in 1983, the XR3 gained fuel injection and other upgrades which lifted power from 95 bhp to 105 bhp, with a new top speed of 120 mph (where speed limits allowed) and was reborn as the XR3i. This time Ford hit the nail exactly on the head and the XR3i is now widely

recognised as a model which helped to democratise performance and handling, previously only available in expensive sports and luxury cars. For much of the decade, the XR3i/XR3i accounted for one third of overall UK Escort sales. In 1986, the range was completed with the advent of the XR3i Cabriolet version, the car which helped mobilise a large swathe of Essex-based twentysomethings into the 1990s and beyond.

Looking back, the XR3i/XR3i embodied the spirit of its age. The car is as potent a symbol of the early 1980s as would be Margaret Thatcher in leg warmers riding in a Sinclair C5 to the tune of 'Don't You Want Me?' by the Human League. It reflects the excitement many felt as the eighties began; that technology was set to expand constantly and make everything in our lives modern and better. That transformation may not have happened as fully and as smoothly as we expected, but the car continues to strike a chord and remain in demand as a modern classic. It also appears in popular culture – there are several songs which mention the XR3i/XR3i, often referring to their use as shelter for young couples looking for privacy to develop their relationships. It will no doubt have played a key role in the lives of many parishioners and is a worthy addition to our virtual garage. I suggest that we add a bright red 1980 XR3i like those used for the M4 press trial. The fleet is growing – please play your part and suggest further models that we can add to the collection.

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
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MEMORIES OF IRON ACTON VILLAGE SHOPS

Following on from the last article on shopping in the village below is a look at how some of the history project interviewees had remembered these. To quote one resident it was "hard to believe now...how many shops it actually had" and another, "if you did any shopping you did it in the village because we didn't have transport into Yate [and] there were no buses to Yate ever".

People remember the post office at Street Farm (run by May Beasley) and then from 1982 in the stores opposite (run by her sister Chrissie Colquhoun), a tearoom and shop run by Mrs Bodie (where the children could get home-made lollipops) at the Clove Hitch and a shop run by Mrs Wallbanks and her daughter Becky at Cornerways. There was a sweet shop (run by Gerty Nichols in the 1930s) and Tom Ford ran Ford & Son's cobblers near Holly Hill when he came out of the army after World War Two. There were even small shops on Chaingate Lane where, during the war, you could get "cigarettes...Oxo cubes and ...sweets".

Mr Huggins was one of two butchers in the village and one interviewee remembered how "they used to kill their own cattle, they had an abattoir at the back, it wouldn't be allowed today, but in those days the butcher used to wheel the barrow-fulls of offal and stuff up through the street past our cottages up the little lane opposite and tip it out on the ground at the back, oh it was horrible, it wouldn't be allowed anymore." There were two ladies who used to make faggots which you could order and call in on your way home from school to collect and there was another who used to do chittelings (the small intestines of domestic animals).

Hector England ran a bakery from Hillside where you could get stale buns after school, who would "have a pan of boiling oil which he put the doughnuts in and then you sugared them" and where "the boys in the a school were allowed to go and get a basket of buns". The same person also remembers going there "one night and dark [sic] and in the bakehouse there was cockroaches everywhere cos that's what you'd used to get years ago."

"Mr Watts, the paperman, had a little newsagents just above where the hall used to be." All the newspapers were delivered from Iron Acton on Sundays by Bert Taylor and during the week by Jim Wockey from Dyers Lane and Mr Watts from Iron Acton. Mr Tiley was the milkman in the late 1950s

The doctors was in Chipping Sodbury and if you got ill "you paid 2s 6d to get Kelly Dyer to get his car out and take you to Sodbury to the doctor."

There was a fish and chip shop on The Green by the bypass and a weekly fish and chip van. Drayes, the oil people, would come round with oil and oil hardware and there was a coalman delivering coal. Surprisingly, after the war there was even an undertaker just for Iron Acton

There was a lady who did the sewing in the village called Sarah Williams who had a small place on the corner of the street. There was a saddler on the corner of Park Street but "when all the cars came in horses were no longer required." The Blanchard family had a blacksmiths on the village green.

Gradually, as Yate grew, the shops dwindled away - "Mrs Warbanks had gone cos her husband died and Her life changed and that shop went completely, the baker died and...there was no more bakery in Iron Acton, the shoe man moved from there to down into the village , Bodies sold up and went...Fursman's he eventually died and that shop closed down...."

UKRAINE.

The fifth (and final?) trip.

The van was not ready in time to transport the Maternity Scanner to Odessa; it being delivered by another driver working for 'From Bristol With Love'. Instead, we were loaded with the usual mix of non-perishable foods, fruit juice, camping equipment, medical supplies, wheelchairs, and generators.

We followed much the same route as the previous trip using a free channel tunnel passage (complimentary one-way only for some reason). We were delayed at the tunnel terminal as they insisted on a commercial GMR form. After much discussion and a few telephone calls to the offices in France, they finally conceded and accepted the usual Self Declaration Form.

The run to Romania was largely uneventful, for a change. The only real point of note was passing a convoy of dozens of army tank transporter trucks in East Germany, presumably en route to Poland.

The off-load was again in Galati but this time with a new group of contacts that Dr Razvan was now using. Everything was unloaded into a storage container for later collection by the Ukrainian army representatives.

On the return run we decided to take a short cut through the Carpathian Mountains on side roads mainly used by logging trucks. These roads were quiet with steep ascents and descents, many hairpin bends and spectacular scenery. Half a day on these side roads saved a few hundred miles.

The rest of the journey went well until a few miles from Dunkirk when a propellor shaft support bearing and bracket disintegrated. The remainder of the drive was completed at lower speeds with a fiercely vibrating prop shaft but the van did manage to complete the trip without the need of recovery.

Once home, we had the prop shaft repaired and the van was now running better than ever. However, it was now time to part company. We sold A19 XDP on eBay to a chap called Gareth from South Wales. He plans to remove the Luton box and it will start a new working life as a recovery truck. He said that he intends to keep the Ukrainian flag stickers on the doors as a nod to it's past.

Many thanks to all who helped with this endeavour. It's been challenging, sometimes stressful, but ultimately rewarding and, hopefully, worthwhile.

What next? I've been contacted by Henry from 'Aid for Ukraine'. He's one of the group lads that I met on the very first trip to Poland. They are still using their Transit van minibus to deliver aid into Ukraine and CasEvac out. (https://youtu.be/M-s_i3AXMRU). They are planning to purchase 5 Pickups in the UK on behalf of the National Guard and deliver them to Kiev. I have volunteered as a delivery driver, if Angie lets me!
